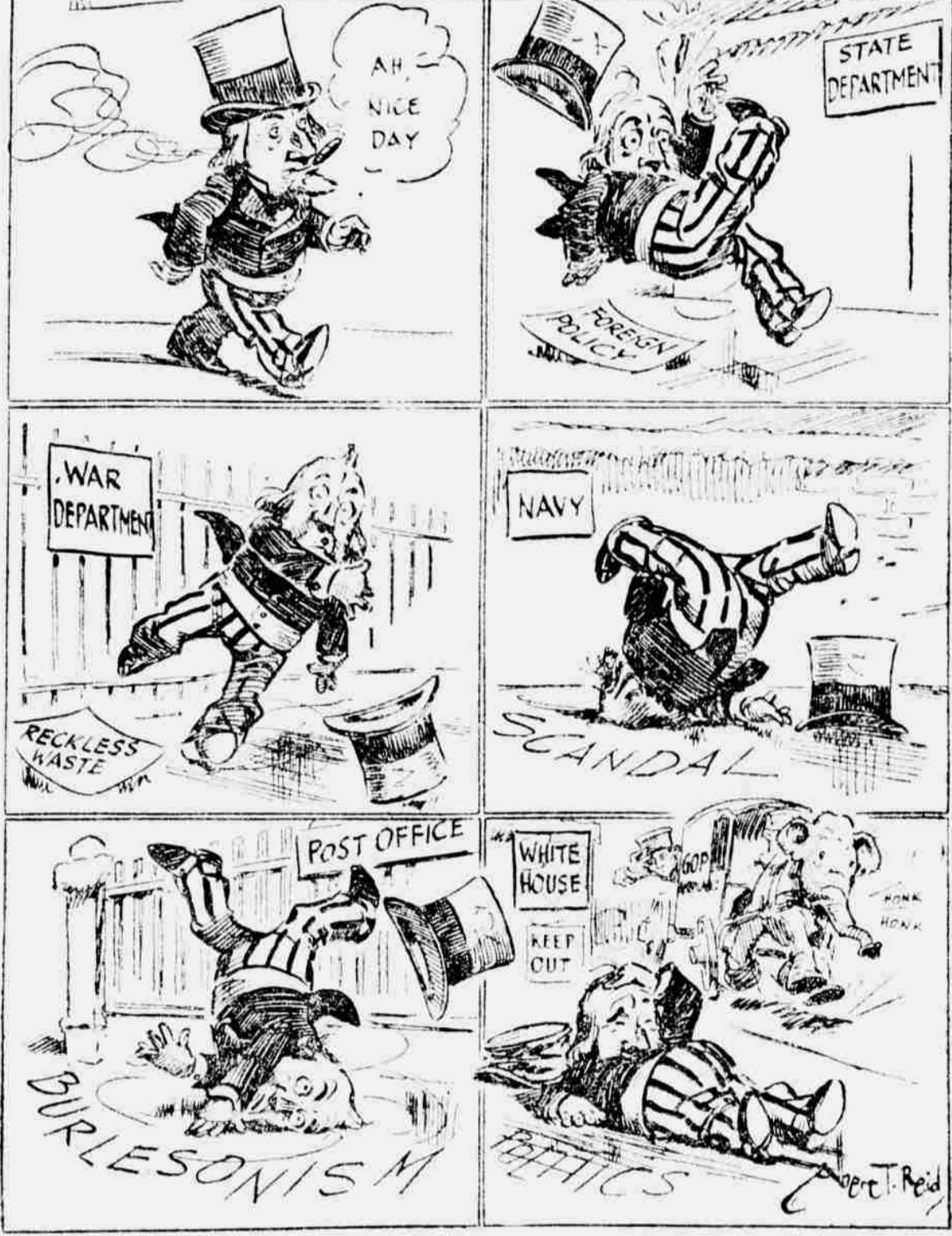
Bandits Abduct American In a Raid on Ranch
