## HOOSIERS TRIM NEBRASKA FIVE IN FIRST GAME

Cornhusker Coach Pays Tribute to Creighton Team, Which Defeated Indiana Wednesday.

Indianapolis, Feb. 5.—The Hoosier basketball team bowed to defeat here tonight before the onslaught of Coach "Lumbo" Steffen's warriors in a first game that ended 24 to 20. The game was the Hoosiers' first since their victory over Indiana in the final game of the season.

Creighton's Schellberg started the scoring with a field goal less than a minute after the whistle blew. Russell came back for the Hoosiers and tied the score. Two more field goals by the Hoosiers ran the score up to 12. The Hoosiers landed two field goals, Indiana then ran the score to 16. Before the Hoosiers could get the ball back, Indiana scored again. Newman followed shortly with a field goal, tying the score. Jackson got Nebraska in the lead with a field goal. Dean came back with a field goal, tying the score, and was followed in a few minutes with a field goal by Byrum, putting Indiana in the lead. The first half ended 13 to 10 with the Hoosiers in the lead.

Nebraska tied the score once during the second half, but never again regained an even lead, with the Hoosiers.

Captain Schellberg was hit out of the game in the second half, but having four successful friends. Russell was the bright light for Nebraska, making half of the Hoosier's points. Phillips, at forward for Indiana, was a close point getter in the second half.

It was a glorious night for Steffen, who has returned to Nebraska to lead the Hoosier basketball team in the Indiana athletic in 1920. This is the first time since 1916. He has been very much elated over the success of his team.
