Reputed Progressive Community's Church Record Revealed—But One Resident Preacher and 182 Church Members—Important Work Now Being Advanced in Nebraska

A great intensive religious and social survey of Nebraska is being made by the Interchurch World Movement. Wheeler county is the most remote in the state to have its survey complete and, in the words of the summary of the survey for that county, "the challenge of the survey brings to light some things which are most romantic enough to become legend."

The survey is under way in more than half the counties of the state and is rapidly being extended into the remaining half of counties. The survey of that county is almost complete. Wheeler county is almost entirely familiar with conditions. No information is secured in writing, but everything must be done by personal investigation. The "summary" must be written on the spot and confirmed in by the county committee.

Nothing is exaggerated. Two hundred and seventy distinct questions are asked of each church, and these answers are tabulated. Three plates of each church accompany the data. When the survey of any one church is complete, the final committee knows everything there is to know about that church. And when the county survey is completed, the county committee knows everything of a religious and civic nature that there is in that county.

Survey Discloses But One Pastor In Wheeler County

Reputed Progressive Community's Church Record Revealed—But One Resident Preacher and 182 Church Members—Important Work Now Being Advanced in Nebraska

The result of the state survey will be of interest to every church member and citizen in the state. The survey was started some time ago. When completed it will be the first work of religious and civic information in Nebraska. Wheeler county is considered one of the most progressive counties in the state, there is but one resident pastor in the county, and only 182 members of churches within the boundaries of the county. The survey shows that but four professional men and three business men belong to Wheeler county churches.

The purpose of the survey is to provide the necessary information for an intensive study of religious and civic needs for the state. A similar survey is in progress in every other state in the nation.

Dr. K. W. Hiller is in charge of the survey in Nebraska. The survey in each county is in charge of a local committee and the individual parish and church surveys are made by committees in each parish which are entirely familiar with conditions. No information is secured in writing, but everything must be done by personal investigation. The "summary" must be written on the spot and confirmed in by the county committee.

Daily Average of "Flu" Cases In Omaha Last Week Shows Decline

A slight increase of new influenza cases is noted by Dr. J. P. Edwards, health commissioner, who reports 14 cases Friday as against 14 cases Thursday. The daily average for this week, including Friday, is 25, which is one third of the daily average for the week before.

The death rate last week was high as indicated by the following figures: Total deaths for the first six days, 78, of which 28 were from influenza and 29 from pneumonia. Deaths reported yesterday: Influenza, 4; pneumonia, 8; other causes, 9. An increase of smallpox cases is reported by the health commissioner, who urges prompt vaccination of all persons who are exposed to this disease.

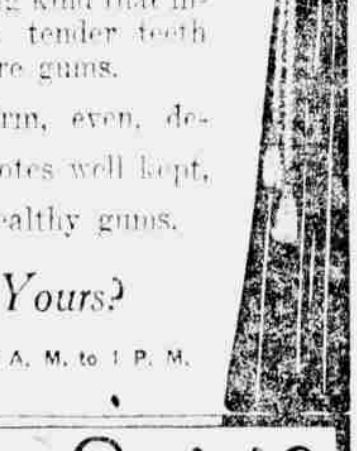
