

SERGEANT HERO TO SHOW CUPS AT TECH. SCHOOL

Omaha Students Inspect Prizes Offered by the Army—Keen Rivalry Between Omaha Institutions.

Students of the Commercial high school will be shown the three silver cups offered by the war department as trophies in the national army essay contest for school children on November 27 during the lunch hour, from 11:30 to 1 today.

The trophies were displayed at Central high school yesterday and a warm rivalry has already started between the two schools as to which will present the best essay.

The subject of the essay will be "The Benefits of Enlistment in the United States Army."

More than 20,000 high school and grammar school students in the 27 recruiting districts of the country will compete.

The cups are being taken from coast to coast by K. M. Patterson, general manager of the Fort Sheridan Recall, the wounded man's newspaper, and Sergt. Robert L. Johns, the first American soldier to enter No-Man's Land.

Sergeant Answers Questions. Lieutenant Patterson and Sergeant Johns took the cups to the high school for the benefit of the students.

After being exhibited there, they were returned to the fourth floor of the Burgess-Nash store, where they may be inspected by the public.

The sergeant hero, who has received several decorations, acts as a guard of honor and answers questions regarding the contest.

Sergeant Johns admitted yesterday morning that fully as many persons asked him about his own experiences overseas as about the prize cups or the essay contest.

He has been the center of interest at the exhibits in other cities, according to Lieutenant Patterson.

The sergeant's home is in St. Louis, Mo. He fought in the war as a member of Company A, 18th infantry, First division. He says that he expects to be discharged from the army at the conclusion of his trip.

They were brought to Omaha by Sergt. Robert L. Johns, first member of the A. E. F. to enter "No Man's Land" in the war. The cups will be on exhibition at the Burgess-Nash store today.

Sergeant Johns arrived in Omaha yesterday with the cups. Two of the watches are for boys, while the third is a girl's bracelet watch.

Only one of the boys' watches has been engraved. "We expect that at least one of the three winners will be a boy," said Lieutenant Patterson.

Omaha Man to Erect Model Buildings on His Holt County Farm

O'Neill, Neb., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—J. S. Sibley, Omaha capitalist, is erecting model buildings on a 640-acre farm he purchased 15 miles northeast of O'Neill last summer.

When the improvements are completed none of the model plants at the government and state experimental farms will excel the Sibley farm, which will cost about \$20,000.

The improvements comprise a modern nine-room dwelling with electric lights, hot and cold water, toasters, stoves, etc.

houses, corncribs, cattle sheds, poultry houses and granaries. A pressure water system will pipe water to all of the buildings and to the tanks in the pens and corrals, all of which will be electric lighted.

The dairy barn will be fitted according to the most approved methods, as will the milk house, where a power separator will be installed.

The main products of the farm are alfalfa, corn and hogs, dairying also playing an important part.

Mr. Sibley accumulated part of his wealth loaning money on Holt county farms, and his decision to build his model plant here, he says, is because he never had to foreclose one of these farm mortgages.

Cedar County Near Top On Oats and Hog Figures

Laurel, Neb., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Cedar county is one of the leading counties in this state in production, according to a report by the Nebraska department of agriculture.

This county topped the list in oats and hogs for 1919. 2,833,803 bushels of oats were raised last year and a survey showed 66,987 head of hogs.

AGED CONFINED IN HOSPITAL FOR INSANE, REPORT

Omaha Woman's Club Told Of State Institutions by Woman Member of Control Board.

There are many old people in our hospitals for insane who are not insane, according to Mrs. G. Peterson, member of the board of commissioners of state institutions.

Mrs. Peterson addressed members of the Woman's club at the Young Women's Christian association yesterday afternoon on institutions maintained by the state.

"Many old people who are in the senile state, but who are suffering from no type of mental disease are placed in hospitals for the insane simply because there is no other place for them," she declared.

"This condition should be remedied for their descendants' sake and for the sake of the old people as well." Opposes Word "Insane."

Mrs. Peterson also urged that steps be taken to remove the word "insane" from the names of institutions for people suffering from mental diseases.

"Fifty years ago such institutions were known as lunatic asylums. That word is never used now and the word 'insane' should also be dropped. The institution at Hastings was once known as a place for the incurable insane. There are many people cured there now."

Mrs. Peterson declared that it was essential that provision be made at once for the segregation of criminal insane and epileptics from others suffering from mental diseases.

Divorce Courts

Earl Crumley was granted a divorce from Nell Crumley in divorce court by Judge Wakeley on allegations of extreme cruelty.

In a divorce petition filed in district court George Faulkner stated that he and his wife, Minnie, lived happily from the time of their marriage in 1907 until he was taken sick with the "flu" in October, 1918.

Ernest Darby told the court his wife, Alta May Darby, beat him, scolded him and neglected to prepare his meals and that she left him and went to California August 15, 1919.

Frank Bick married Antonia Bick in 1898 and lived happily, he says, until a few years ago. He says he has scars to show where his wife struck him. She compelled him to turn over all his earnings to her and bought two houses with the money.

Verna Roach, according to the allegations of her husband, Thomas, in petition for divorce, took all their dishes and silverware down in the cellar one day and dumped them into the ash can.

Stanton, Neb., Feb. 9.—(Special.)—Kern sale of pure bred Duroc Jersey sows sold for records when they were sold for a total of \$109,875, averaging over \$1,830.

The first 40 head in the catalogue sold for an average of \$2,300, which surpasses all previous Duroc sales. The nearest sale to this average was reached when 38 head were sold at an average of \$1,760.
