TAXATION LAWS **CALL FOR EXTRA** DIET SESSIONS

Full Suffrage Will Be Given Women if Peterson Proposal Carries—Revenue Plans Start Oratory.

Taxation was the theme of much oratory in the constitutional convention and for the first time for a long time the convention held

The Pollard amendment providing that "the necessary revenue of the state and its government subin such a manner as the legis-lature shall direct, but taxes shall be levied by valuation uniformly and proportionately upon all tangible property and franchises, and taxes uniform as to class may be levied by valuation upon all other property. Taxes other than property taxes my be authorized by law. Existing revenue laws shall continue in effect until changed by legislature." The matter of exemptions is still to be arrangded.

Women will be granted every constitutional right as voters if the present almost unanimous sentiment of the legislature is carried out as embraced in proposal No. 228. Peterson of Lancaster offered an amendment to the effect that wherever the constitution mentions "him" or "his" it shall be held to also apply to the feminine gender. for which they were elected,

State Supreme Court Preparing Papers In Appeal of Grammer

The state supreme court is busy here today preparing the necessary papers to be sent to St. Louis for hearing of an appeal for writ of habeas corpus for Allen V. Grammer, who, with Alson B. Cole, is sentenced to die in the electric chair February 20. The hearing is to be teld Saturday at 2 p. m. before the United States circuit court of ap-

Grammer and Cole are now waiting out their sixth reprieve. They were convicted of the murder of Mrs. Luly Vogt, Grammer's mother-in-law, in Howard county in 1917.



Bank Cashier Brought Back to Nebraska to

Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 11.-(Special.) -Gus A. Hyers, chief of the state Alliance Home Builders' law enforcement department, arrived here at noon today from Denver with R. B. Lower, former assistant cashier of the Valparaiso State bank, charged with embezzle-ment of \$17,500 of the bank's funds. Lower had been released on bail, following the failure of the bank, and when notified to appear for trial, could not be found. He was detained in Denver when about to board a train leaving the city. He be taken to Wahoo to await trial.

Receiver E. E. Fike, now charge of the bank's affairs, has filed an application with Judge E. E.
