New York, Feb. 15 .- Granting of woman suffrage "over the heads of the people," by legislative act cannot stand the test in the courts

that will inevitably ensue" is the assertion made in a statement issued here by the National Association Opposed to Women Suffrage. "These cases," the statement continues, "should ratification be obtained in time for women to vote this year, will not only hold up the election result as did the Hayes-Tilden conflict, but possibly necessitate a second election.
