

CITY LEAGUE HOLDS FIRST MEET OF YEAR

Four Teams Enrolled in Oldest Amateur Base Ball Organization—Two Teams Still to Join.

Formation of the City amateur base ball league, the oldest organization playing under the banner of the local amateur base ball association, was virtually completed last night at a meeting held in the office of Park Commissioner Falchner.

Two More to Join. The City league will consist of six teams this season and the remaining two franchises have been asked for.

In case these two teams fail to appear at the meeting next Monday they will forfeit their franchise and the Sample-Harts, last season members of the American league, and the Highland Park Pharmacy, of the Booster league, will be given their berths.

Manager Frank Hubatka of the Sample-Harts, who was present at last night's meeting, pleaded with the City league managers and President Jacobs for a franchise.

Meetings Next Week. The American, Greater Omaha, Booster, Inter-City, Gate City, Church and Commercial leagues will again be represented in the field during the 1920 season.

Plans are also under way for the formation of leagues between the manufacturers, wholesalers and mercantile houses of Omaha and South Omaha.

Secretary J. J. Isaacson of the Municipal Amateur Base Ball association announced that the auditing committee of the association will meet this week and that the big mass meeting for all players, managers, backers and those interested in amateur ball will probably be held some time next week.
