FEW DECLINES IN FOOD PRICES ARE REPORTED

Butter, Eggs and Poultry **Advance While Vegetables** And Dried Fruits Are Cheaper.

General advances of from 4 to 6 cents during the last week in Omaha retail quotations on buttter and eggs squelched hopes of consumers for continued purchase of those commodities at comparatively low prices.

Fresh eggs have jumped from the 50-cent bottom price of last week up to 55 cents and there has been an average increase of 4 cents a pound for all classes of butter, which now retails at from 55 to 68 cents,

Poultry is still high, with dressed hens retailing at 44 cents at the big downtown stores, roosters at 35 cents and ducks at 37 cents. Dressed turkey, being handled only in small quantities by retailers, is selling at Cabbage Is Cheaper.

Dried raisins, peaches and pears are quoted at 25 cents a pound, prunes at from 20 cents to 25 cents, currants at 30 cents and apricots.

Figs, of the layer, table variety. have shot down from 45 cents to 30 cents and 25 cents a pound during the last week.

Retailers report little prospect of an immediate drop in flour prices, most of them predicting flour reached its bottom price during the recent market flurry and is not apt to go so low again soon. It is being offeered in 48-pound sacks at \$3.20 and in 24-pound sacks at \$1.65.
