



Bolshevist Threat Causes the Government to Decide Home Force Is Not Sufficient.

By COL. HENRY J. REILLY. Prior to the present war the organization of the British land forces was based on the principle that Great Britain was primarily a sea power and therefore only needed a force at home to resist any invader and garrisons for her overseas naval

The only exception made to this was India, where the preeminence of land forces was recognized. This policy ignored the fact that in all her wars with her rivals she had had to put an army on the continent of Europe and maintain it there.

The trained soldier and historian knew this because he knew that British freedom from invasion, and therefore her naval supremacy (because once the bases of a fleet are captured by an army it is finished), depended upon no strong enemy being allowed possession of the continental shore of the channel. They knew that in the past Great Britain had again and again to put an army into what is now Belgium to keep the east coast of the channel out of enemy hands. They knew that in any war with Germany it was of the umost importance that this coast be secure from enemy attack.
