

SERVICE MEN TO BACK PERSHING

Letters Asking Nebraska Ex-Soldiers to Work for A. E. F. Commander For President.

The Nebraska Soldiers' and Sailors' Pershing club, with headquarters at 107 Paxton hotel, Omaha, sent a letter with membership cards enclosed to all the former service men in this state, calling upon them to join the club and help put Nebraska "over the top" for Pershing. Responses are now coming in.

The letter, which bears the signature of sixty odd former Nebraska

soldiers, reads: consulted as to the men who are to serve as the officials of the govern-ment you fought to maintain. "Our American Legion and our

Veterans of Foreign Wars association are organized for purposes other than political, and, of course, should be kept out of partisan poli-tics. It is essential, however, that as individuals we have our personal preference as to candidates for public office and work with each other to secure their election.

"We, the undersigned, were a part of America's army.
