New York Times-Chicago Tribune Cable, Copyright, 1920 Paris, March 7.—Appearance of a British squadron in the Golden Horn has aroused the fears of the French that Great Britian is about to spring a surprise and seize Constantinople like D'Annunzio grabbed Fiume. Carefully worded dispatches uttering warnings of riots and troubles which may develop in Constantinople following the overthrow of the Turkish cabinet have been sent to London by the admiral commanding the squadron. These, it is believed, may be intended to camouflage occupation of the city under the mask of protection to foreigners.

The French and Italian governments are contemplating sending battle squadrons to Constantinople.
