

**WIFE MADE HIM
SLEEP IN BARN.
SIECK ALLEGES**

**Johanna's Pitching Arm Was
of Big League Class, Millard
Man Declares In
Reply.**

Hans Sieck of Millard, Neb., did not lead an extremely happy life with his second wife, Johanna Sieck, he says in an answer filed Monday in district court to her petition for divorce filed February 11.

Johanna said that Hans used up all the money she had when he married her, February 1, 1919, and then began beating her. She was granted a restraining order against him.

But Hans charges Johanna was "exactly the gentle angel she represents herself to be."

Sang Praise of "Bad Bill."

Hans says she persisted in singing unpatriotic songs, designed for the praise of Bill Hohenzollern, former Kaiser, and of his son, the former crown prince, and called herself the princess of Germany.

One night, he says, she compelled him to sleep in the barn.

Once in Omaha she tore his coat and trousers in a fight, and then spat in his face, Hans complains.

He alleges she threw a small dog against an ice chute, breaking its back and that, when he remonstrated she told him she "would do the same to him."

Hurls Lamp With Effect.

One evening in November, 1919, she picked up a lamp and hurled it at him with telling effect, says he.

On another occasion the family Bible was the missile which she threw at Hans, he says. A decorated glass flower vase was thrown by her on another memorable occasion, he says.

Hans asks that their property be divided equally. When they were married, he alleges, they agreed to that. Most of the property belonged to Mrs. Sieck before the marriage, including a farm at Millard valued at \$20,000.
