have to estimate a distance lay off with your eye a series of 100-yard lengths between you and the object to which you are measuring—just as though you were measuring them with a yardstick.

"You want to remember, though, that as your 100-yard lengths get farther away from you they will seem shorter. So take this into account when you are measuring."

After you have made your estimate stride off the distance and see how near you guessed. Do you know what your stride is?"

"I don't know," said Billy, who had no idea what his uncle meant by "stride."

"Well, find out. Get somebody to help you measure off a mile. Then walk that mile several times. Try to make your steps all of even length. Count the number of steps you take to the mile each time."

From the average you can figure out how many strides you take to 100 yards. Then when you measure a distance just stride it off and you have it.

"If you ever have to draw any maps, you will find that a knowledge of the length of your stride is the first thing you will have to get. A lot of men in the old regular army got the matter down to such a fine point that they could make very accurate maps with no other means of measuring than their 'strides.' You have to work at it for a long time, though, before you can get it with any degree of accuracy."

Proposal to Narrow Tenth Street Viaduct Is Opposed In Council

A resolution offered to the city council Tuesday by Commissioner Towle proposing that the city engineer approve plans for narrowing the Tenth street viaduct from 59 to 44 feet between the depots, aroused considerable opposition and resulted in referring the resolution to the committee of the whole for deliberation.

The Union Pacific and Burlington railroad companies propose to build a new superstructure of reinforced concrete and to maintain the walks at the present width of nine feet and three inches.

The first opposition to the resolution was that it delegated too much power to the city engineer. Mayor Smith and Commissioners Falconer, Ure and Butler were outspoken in their opposition to any reduction of the width of this viaduct.

Mr. Towle explained the proposed reduction of width would be between depots only and he added that there would be no buildings on the west side of the viaduct along the line of the proposed narrowing.
