

CHILD WELFARE IS DISCUSSED BY CODE MISSION

Protection of Children Rather Than Mother's Family Is Advocated — Favor New Court.

Prominent workers of the city and state for children's welfare were present at a conference of the Nebraska Children's Code commission. The principal subject was the welfare of children born out of wedlock.

"There are no illegitimate children but only illegitimate parents," declared Judge Arthur Wray of New York, who presided. Judge Wray advocated the substitution of the term "natural child" for the more common term.

"Every child of unmarried parents should be under supervision of the state," declared Dr. H. H. Antles, secretary of the state department of public welfare. "The child comes first. Don't wrong the child to save the family of the mother. The child has a right to the same inheritance as the child of wedded parents."

"Maternity homes run by private persons are bad. I know of one boy handed about five times before he was 13 months old."

Judge W. W. Slabaugh was applauded when he declared that a court of domestic relations should be established to force fathers, whether married or not, to support their children.

T. H. Weirich told of the work of the Salvation Army rescue home in obtaining homes for illegitimate children. Adjutant Lillie News of the Salvation Army declared that mothers should be taught to care for their children and that the children should not be "farmed out" except as a last resort.

Jews to Carry Religion of Fathers to Those in America

New York, March 19.—Co-operation by Jews and Christians in a national campaign to carry the religion of their fathers to 4,000,000 Jews in America was agreed to in a recent conference here by representatives of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, the Federal Council of Churches and the Home Missions Council, it was announced today. Campaign plans will be made at a meeting here Monday.

PREDICTS LIBERTY BONDS WILL DRAW PREMIUM BY 1922

No Cause to Worry Over Market, Controller of Currency Says.

Washington, March 19.—Liberty bonds will command a premium on the market within the next two years, in the opinion of John Skelton Williams, controller of the currency. Mr. Williams in an interview declared that holders of Liberty bonds need have no reason to worry over present market conditions.

Mr. Williams said the low quotations offered investors an extraordinary opportunity to obtain at very attractive figures the best security in the world.

"I see no reason why anybody should worry about the market price of Liberty bonds," said Mr. Williams. "The bonds constitute as good an investment as there is. The government did not promise to pay on demand. It promised to pay at maturity, and it will keep its word."

Will Command Premium.

"I believe that within two years or less the bonds will be up to par and will command a premium."

Majority of Men Selected Believed to Be in Favor of Plan.

Washington, March 19.—Chairman Kahn of the house military committee selected a subcommittee to frame legislation providing for compulsory military training, a majority of which is considered favorable to the adoption of a training plan. Representatives Dent, Alabama, and Quinn, Mississippi, democrats, are the only selections regarded as unalterably opposed to compulsory training.

The other selections were Representative Kahn, California; Greene, Vermont; Sanford, New York; McKenzie, Illinois, republicans; and Olney, Massachusetts, democrats. These committee members recently approved adoption of a training plan, excepting Mr. McKenzie, who opposed immediate action.

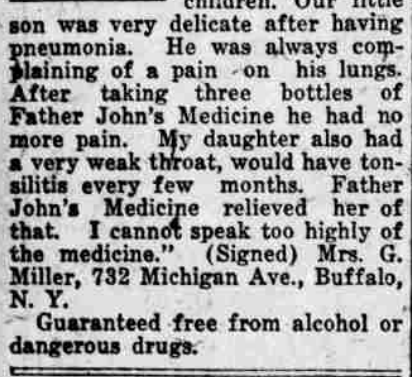
