Ohio Woman Thinks That Republicans Will Win There.

Mrs. Harriet Taylor Upton, who recently was appointed chairman of the women's division of the Ohio state republican committee, has completed a survey of the women voters of the state, with the result that she predicts that Ohio will go republican by a large majority in the campaign of 1920.

Mrs. Upton, who was widely known as a suffragist, and was treasurer of the National American Woman Suffrage association and a member of the board of directors of the Leslie commission, has practically completed organizing the women of this state, although but a short time in office. She is assisted by Miss Rose Moriarty, one of the organizers of the national republican committee, who has the task of organizing women in Ohio, Michigan and Wisconsin.

Mrs. Upton, who is the daughter of the late Senator Taylor of Ohio, was brought up on a political diet. She is known as the "woman Simon Ford" and is a famous humorous after-dinner speaker.

Addressing a group of republican women in Ohio recently, Mrs. Upton told her first experience in politics when as a child she kept the poll books for her father, Senator Taylor.

"To this day," said Mrs. Upton, "I can make a better 'R' than I can a 'D'."

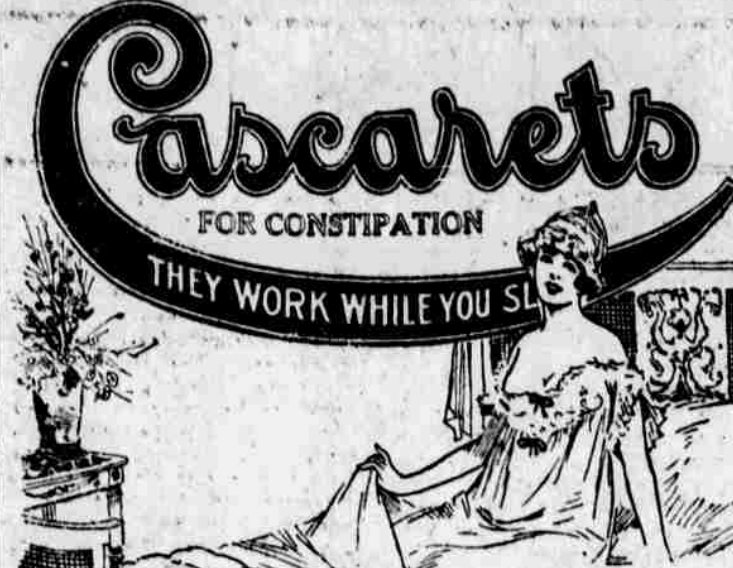
