

THINK JEALOUSY BACK OF DEATH OF LAD AT ST. JOSEPH

Envious Schoolboy Rivals Believed to Have Poisoned St. Joseph High School Athlete.

St. Joseph, Mo., March 25.—(Special.)—Jealousy of schoolmates over his expected success in his tryout for the school track team is now believed by police to be the motive for the mysterious death of Raymond E. Haynes, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Haynes, here.

Tried to Dope Him.

Schoolmates were known to be jealous of his ability as an athlete. Detectives working on the case believe some of them attempted to "dope" Raymond, so that he could not start in the field competition.

Following his sudden illness, Raymond made a brave fight for life. But Saturday he began sinking gradually.

Hold Post-Mortem.

Dr. Forest Thomas, coroner, conducted a post-mortem examination of the body, and took the stomach to Kansas City for chemical analysis. Report of the findings is expected within a few days.

tended the lad, stated that he is satisfied the boy died of slow poisoning, probably wood alcohol. He said the lad became blind three days before his death, and that only for a few moments during his rally Sunday morning, was he able to see.

Indicate Wood Alcohol.

The post-mortem revealed that the right side of the brain was hard and inflamed, although the left side was normal. The heart was found greatly inflated, and the kidneys congested. These findings indicate wood alcohol poisoning, Dr. Cook said.

A coroner's jury was called to view the body before it was buried Tuesday. An inquest will be held upon the receipt of the report of the Kansas City chemist from the examination of the stomach.

AD BARES ROW BETWEEN BANK AND BUILDERS

Shafers and Geiselman of the American State Bank Air Their Differences.

Differences between officers of the American State bank and the American Bank Building company came to the surface this week when an advertisement was published stating that the American State bank is in no way connected with the American Bank Building company, and is not responsible for any of the building company's acts or obligations.

The advertisement was signed by the American State bank. "It is true that there is no connection between the bank and the building company," said M. F. Shafer, president of the bank building, but my brother, W. E. Shafer, vice president of the building company, and I own 55 per cent of the bank stock.

"The advertisement was inserted by D. W. Geiselman, who owns only a small portion of the bank's stock, but who became vice president of the bank at the last directors' meeting. Geiselman knows he will be removed from office at the next board meeting and is attempting to force us to sell our stock."

"We have made repeated attempts to buy his stock, but he won't sell. The American State bank will occupy the new building to be constructed by the American Bank Building company."

Geiselman said the advertisement was placed with the sanction of the bank's directors. He would make no further comment.

A. G. Ellick, attorney for the American State bank, substantiated Mr. Geiselman's statement that the advertisement was used with the sanction of the bank's board of directors.
