Candidate to National Convention

Mrs. Frank E. Dunbar of Plattsmouth has filed as delegate to the republican national convention. She is the first woman to file for that office. Mrs. Dunbar is chairman of the Cass County Women's Pershing-for-President organization and has organized every town in the county.

She is an enthusiastic Pershing booster, but says she will support the choice of the people if elected to the convention. Mrs. Dunbar was active in Red Cross work during the war and at present is taking a prominent part in organizing service men.

In filing her petition Mrs. Dunbar issued a statement in which she said: "In order to prove that we are capable of discharging our duty as voters, the women of Nebraska must take an active interest in the

politics of our state. Participation in politics is as much an innovation with me as it is with the majority of women.

"I realize what an honor it would be to represent the republican voters of the First district at the national convention and I have accepted the filing made to place my name upon the republican primary ballot as a candidate for district alternate

from the First congressional district. "I hope that the republicans of Nebraska will instruct the delegation for Nebraska's own John J. Pershing, whom I believe to be the best fitted man to lead our party to victory. Regardless of my personal preference, however, I will support at the convention the man for whom the electors of Nebraska instruct me to vote."
