

LOCAL MERCHANT EXPLAINS WHY HE FAVORS PERSHING

O. E. Berg Says General Stands for All That is Highest and Best in American Manhood.

"General Pershing's father, John Pershing, used to travel in Nebraska for a Chicago clothing house, as did General Pershing's brother, James Pershing. And the father at one time lived in Lincoln. I knew both the father and brother very well, and, of course, I am in favor of General Pershing for president of the United States."

Thus spoke O. E. Berg, president of the Berg Clothing company. "I am most heartily in favor of the nomination of General Pershing for the presidency," continued Mr. Berg. "I want to see General Pershing nominated by the Chicago convention and afterwards elected by the people, not only because he is a Nebraskan, but also because he has demonstrated that he is eminently qualified to discharge the duties of chief executive of this nation. General Pershing is a big man in every way, and I believe that if he is elected president, his administration will be one of the best the country has ever had."

Knew Pershing on Road.

Mr. Berg has been a well known Omaha merchant for many years. Previous to entering business for a long time he travelled in Nebraska for a big Chicago clothing house. One of the men with whom he used to travel in the old days and knew intimately was John Pershing, father of Nebraska's candidate for the presidency. He knew also in those

days James Pershing, a brother of the general, who, like this father, travelled in this state as a clothing salesman, and who is now engaged in the clothing business in New York.

"There is mighty good stuff in the Pershing family," said Mr. Berg, recalling the days when he was a fellow traveler in Nebraska of the elder Pershing and his son. "John Pershing, General Pershing's father, lived at Lincoln for a short time, back in the eighties and I think what at that time his daughter, Miss May Pershing, was a student at the state university. John Pershing met and became well acquainted with many of the merchants in Nebraska back in the days when he travelled in this state. I went from town to town with him in those days and came to know him very well indeed. He was a fine, honest, upstanding man, and everybody who knew him respected and liked him. He was a large man—larger, as I recall, than his famous son—and was what you would call a 'raw-boned Yankee.' He was one of those men who look you squarely in the eye and give you an impression of honesty and shrewdness."

"I met General Pershing, as I recall, when he was at West Point. I have followed his career with a great deal of interest and am extremely proud of him, as every other Nebraskan should be. He is a man of excellent mind, of the highest character and of great poise. Like most other Americans who have achieved great things, he has won success through his own efforts—by diligent application to business and by the exercise of great natural talents.

"Why shouldn't Nebraska be in favor of Pershing for president, I should like to know? Isn't he a citizen of this state? Isn't he one of us now? Isn't he one of the world's most illustrious men? Hasn't he measured up to every demand made upon him? If there is a better organizer, a better executive in this country than he has shown himself to be, I don't know where you would look to find him. General Pershing would make an excellent president, and I'm for him with all my heart, as every Nebraskan should be."
