It was referred to the contingent expenses committee, which will recommend whether funds for the inquiry should

be voted. The resolution proposed an investigation of any existing strike of railroad employes not authorized by the leaders of the railroad workers union. Senator Pomerene, democrat, Ohio, wanted to know whether the resolution would apply specifically Angeles, Buffalo and other cities

have disregarded the judgment of their responsible leaders."
