

BRYAN SAYS HIS HITCHCOCK RAPS ARE CONFESSED

In Renewed Attack, Commoner Claims Charges In His Indictment Virtually Conceded.

Claiming that every charge made in his indictment of Senator Hitchcock is virtually confessed by the Omaha World-Herald in replies to his attacks, William Jennings Bryan comes forth in a renewed attack. "The World-Herald, after two days' reflections, makes a reply which virtually confessed every charge made in my indictment of Senator Hitchcock," says Mr. Bryan. "First—It is silent on the charge that in 1912 Senator Hitchcock championed Wall street's candidate for the democratic nomination for president. The senator is not sorry and makes no pretense of change in his sympathies. "Second—It does not deny that the senator wrote the republican minority report against the currency bill and stood with Wall street against the material features of the bill. It simply claims for him that he proposed some amendments and voted for it on its final passage (when he found that he could not kill the bill and his vote was not needed for its passage). "Insult to 45 States. "Third—It claims that prohibition is a dead issue and that Mr. Hitchcock's advocacy of wine and beer does not raise a major issue." It

does not deny that the senator tried to prevent prohibition and refused to give expression to the known wishes of his constituents on the question. "It does not give Senator Hitchcock's definition of harmless beverage—the alcoholic contents is not mentioned—or explain why the senator dignified the wine and beer issue by making it the only one mentioned in his telegram to those in charge of his Omaha coming-out banquet. "The nation can not trust the enforcement of prohibition to one who does not believe in it. His nomination would be an insult to the 45 states that ratified prohibition, and a handicap to the democratic candidates in the 34 states that have adopted prohibition and in the dry districts of the states that have not adopted prohibition by state action.

Waives Suffrage Question. "Fourth—The World-Herald waives the suffrage question aside as a settled question, but does not explain why the party should defend all women voters of the country by nominating a man who insolently insisted upon putting the most depraved men above women as citizens, and did this after his own state had conferred suffrage by statute and after the legislature had by unanimous vote requested him to vote for submission of the national amendment. "Fifth—It misrepresents my position on the treaty. I commended Mr. Hitchcock's fight for ratification without reservations while that seemed possible, but insisted on ratification with reservations when a majority agreed upon reservations and condemn Senator Hitchcock for opposing majority rule in the senate and for trying to make the treaty an issue in the coming campaign.

Would Bettle Differences. "After ignoring the charges against Mr. Hitchcock, the World-Herald attempts to belittle the differences between Senator Hitchcock and myself. It is sufficient to say in reply that these differences, when much less important than they are now, were sufficient to make Mr. Hitchcock feel justified in opposing me as delegate to two national conventions. "If, in spite of past agreements, the differences were such as to forfeit my claim, thrice a democratic candidate for president, to Mr. Hitchcock's support for delegate in 1912 and 1916 (and in 1920 also), with what consistency can the senator deny that the larger differences of today are sufficient to forfeit his claim to my support for a presidential nomination? "The real question before the democracy of Nebraska is whether it can best aid the cause of democracy by sending Mr. Bryan as a delegate to the national convention or by paying Senator Hitchcock an empty compliment."

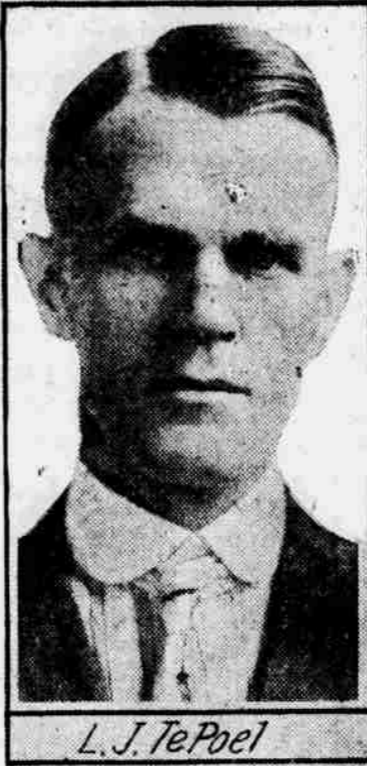
Bryan Reiterates Stand Against Senator Hitchcock

BOYS MUST AID ON FARMS DUE TO HELP-SHORTAGE

Winside Farmer Says Paying Youths Only Solution To Problem of Labor.

That it will be necessary to put farm boys 10 and 12 years old to work on the farms after school has closed to make up for the shortage of hired farm help is the opinion of John Newman of Winside, who was a visitor at the South Omaha stock yards Thursday with a couple of loads of live stock. "Many of our youngsters, who have never handled the reins over a work team, will be taught how to run riding cultivators, plows, hay rakes and mowers, because we can not get enough farm help," he said. "The boys will not be given heavy work and they can easily be of great service with a gentle work team and riding farm implements. It will keep their minds occupied and a great deal easier task than carrying water to farm hands during harvest, doing chores or weeding gardens. "I think those boys will make better farm help than the average hand that comes from the city and there will be no necessity of teaching them the general run of farm work, as they will take to it as natural as a duck takes to water. I think it is the nearest solution to the problem of the shortage of farm help. Of course, farmers must expect to pay their boys well, which will encourage them and give them something to look forward to."

Austrian Chancellor In Rome to Get Help For Constituents

Rome, April 8.—Means of meeting grave needs of the Austrian republic and establishment of rapid communications with the United States through Trieste are objects which have brought Dr. Karl Renner, Austrian chancellor, to Rome. He told the Associated Press today he hoped to arrange important commercial relations with America and that Austria desires to resume cordial intercourse with Italy. "I am at the Italian capital," he said, "representing the new Austrian democratic republic, which has nothing to do with the empire and nothing in common with the traditions of the Hapsburg monarchy. "Fulfillment of the provisions of the treaty of St. Germain is the duty before us. We do not ask either a total or partial revision of that convention, but only a friendly understanding as to the best means to loyally apply it."

\$40,000 Lutheran Church Is Planned at Fremont

Fremont, Neb., April 8.—(Special.)—With its attendance swelling to the largest of the Protestant churches of Fremont by faculty and students of Midland college, the Salem Lutheran church has decided to build a new \$40,000 structure.
