

MUSIC MASTERS HEAR FROM THE STATE WRITERS

Nebraska Composers' Program Winds Up Convention—Fremont to Get Next Meet.

The closing program of the Nebraska Music Teachers' association took place on Thursday afternoon at the Nebraska Composers' program. This brought many interesting and attractive compositions of merit to the attention of the audience, and showed creative ability of a high order to be found in the composers of our own state.

Several of the composers took an active part in the interpretation of their own music, many of them as accompanists to their songs. The other musicians who assisted in presenting the different numbers for the most part gave creditable performances from which it was possible to get a clear idea of the nature and quality of the music.

Beautiful Piano Numbers.

Among the more pretentious numbers presented were found some surprisingly beautiful. The piano and violin sonata by the late Sigismund Landsberg of Omaha was well interpreted by Sidney Silber of Lincoln and Henry G. Cox of Omaha. The themes are strong and well contrasted, and the three different movements each hold individuality and consistent character, the second movement being especially good.

The "Andante Cantabile" from the "Quintet in D major" by Carl Beutzel of University Place was a most attractive and well written number and the Andante for piano and strings by Dr. W. F. Dann of Lincoln was one of the most pleasing numbers of the whole program, with its classic style and melodious flowing themes, and clever part writing. These were interpreted by a quartet of strings composed of Henry G. Cox, Mrs. E. R. Reese, Will Hetherington and Edwin Clark. Mr. Beutzel at the piano in his own composition and Miss Ruth Flynn in the quintet by Dr. Dann.

Songs That Please.

The songs brought a wide variety to the program. J. A. Parks of York, Neb., was represented by three charming songs of grace and beauty of melody interpreted by Charlotte van Winkle Jacobs of York, the possessor of a bright soprano voice.

Among the most interesting songs were those presented by Paul Reuter of Seward. They had atmosphere and were consistent and musical. An attractive "Springtime" was repeated by request from the program of the association last year.

Miss Lindsay Carlson of Crete, Miss Edna Carnal and Sigismund

Landsberg of Omaha and August Moller of Lincoln were also represented by attractive and meritorious songs, and Cecil Berryman and August Moller in two clever humorous songs. It was impossible to judge of the compositions of Lillian Bank's "Song Cycle," as the composer who presented them herself was ill, and did not do them justice.

Among the assisting musicians who aided most effectively are Mrs. Louise Jansen Wylie and Lena Ellsworth Dale of Omaha.

Owing to the illness of one of the members, the Elks' quartet were unable to present the various numbers announced for them.

Fremont was chosen as the place of meeting of the Nebraska Music Teachers' association for 1921. This was decided at the Thursday morning session of the convention, which, with the exception of an attractive group of piano solos by Miss Ruth Flynn, was devoted entirely to business.

The new officers elected for the

ensuing year were C. M. Boggess of Fremont, president; J. H. Simms of Omaha, vice president, and Mr. Carlson of Fremont, secretary-treasurer.

Following the business meeting Henry G. Cox entertained the new and old officers at luncheon at the University club.

RE-ELECT OMAHA MAN LEADER OF LUTHERAN BODY

Rev. C. F. Sandahl Is Unanimously Chosen President Of Conference at Meeting Here.

Rev. C. F. Sandahl of Omaha was unanimously re-elected president of the Lutheran Nebraska conference of the Augustana synod yesterday at the Zion Lutheran church. Other officers elected were: Rev. O. G. Berg, Genoa, vice president; Rev. F.

J. Ellman, Bertrand, secretary; Gust Monteen, Wahoo, treasurer.

About 100 delegates from Nebraska, Wyoming and South Dakota are in attendance at this convention. Rev. A. T. Lorimer, in welcoming the visitors in behalf of his church, called attention to the fact that this convention is the first occasion of the conference being entertained by a strictly English-speaking church. The trend is very noticeable in the conference towards the use of English as the only medium of language in the church work.

Business Session Today.

A delegation from the Nebraska synod of the United Lutheran church was present at the morning session yesterday and extended fraternal greetings.

At the morning session today the conference will consider plans for a new girls' dormitory of the conference academy at Wahoo. Budget system plans for carrying on the

finances of the conference will come up. Report of the pension fund drive for ministerial aid, of which the Nebraska conference is the first conference in the synod to report its full quota and 40 per cent above of the \$500,000 fund to be raised. A visit will be made to the Immanuel Deaconess institute at the close of the afternoon session by all delegates. A China mission festival will be held at night with a program, under the auspices of the Woman's Home and Foreign Mission society.

Jews and Mohammedans at Constantinople in Battle

Jerusalem, April 8.—Although martial law was proclaimed here on Monday and the city is under heavy patrol by British troops, scattered fights occurred between Jews and Mohammedans Monday and Tuesday in the narrow lanes of the old city and outside the walls. Several persons were killed on both sides

and about 250 were injured, most of them slightly.

When martial law was established entrance to the city was forbidden, but this rule was relaxed today and normal conditions seemed near.

Three More Women Pickets At British Embassy in Jail

Washington, April 8.—Irish pickets appeared at the British embassy again today and were promptly arrested by the police on charges of violating a federal statute. The pickets arrested were: Miss

Mary Galvin, Philadelphia; Maura Quinn, Jamaica Plains, Mass.; Katherine McKeen, Philadelphia. The women did not furnish bail and were taken to the house of detention to await preliminary trial before United States Commissioner Richardson.
