in another betrayal of the Irish people; nor will it acquiesce in a further withholding of that which is the symbol of national political liberty," said Henderson, who is looked upon as one of the labor aspirants Plan for Former Soldiers for the British premiership.

Henderson, in reviewing labor's opportunty in the new Parliamentary session, believes Lloyd George's coalition government is headed for the rocks.

Requires New Policy.

"What the country requires," eavs Henderson, "is a policy that will keep together not the present gove ernment, but the best elements of the whole community, that will advance not the small interests of a combination of politicians, but the best interests of all the freedomloving nations within the British commonwealth, and which will maintain the British nation in the forefront of the peaceful nations of the

"The present government has failed so far to provide such a program, and continued failure in this direction will but spur the labor party during the coming session to even more determined and effective opposition.
