

# MARSHALL ASKS PRESS TO SOAK THE DISTURBER

Vice-President Speaking at Annual Banquet of Associated Press, Praises the Fourth Estate.

New York, April 20.—Vice-President Marshall was applauded by members of The Associated Press at their annual meeting today when he advocated freedom of speech and press as guaranteed by the constitution, but favored "soaking it to the fellow who causes trouble in the American republic by what he says."

After deprecating the great amount of publicity given to crime and suggesting that newspapers pour oil on the troubled waters of unrest by speaking of the fine things in American life, Mr. Marshall told the meeting what he thought would be the real news, namely "a clarion call from every newspaper in America for men to stand for justice, for freedom, for right, for the maintenance of the old constitution and the old principles upon which the republic was founded."

The vice president counselled against being discouraged at high prices. He recalled the days after the civil war, when he said, flour sold for \$20 a barrel, quinine for \$20 an ounce and calico for 80 cents a yard.

The luncheon opened with a toast to the fully restored health of President Wilson, proposed by Frank B. Noyes, president of The Associated Press. Briefly reviewing the work of The Associated Press, Mr. Noyes said it had become a "hall mark of accuracy whether the events recorded in the election of the president, the signing of an armistice, a decision of the supreme court or the death of a pope."

**Bryan Women Active in Lincoln—Voting Steady**

Lincoln, Neb., April 20.—(Special.)—At noon today voting in Lincoln had not rushed the voting-place officials very much. The voting began as soon as the polls opened and kept up a steady stream most of the forenoon with little or no crowding.

Activity about the polling places was mostly confined to the giving out of cards containing the different national delegate tickets, but the most activity was observed on the part of the women who were boosting for Mr. Bryan.

**M. and O. Railroad to Change Branch Train Schedules**

**Governor Gets Copy of Old Deed to Part of Harbor**

Lincoln, Neb., April 20.—(Special.)—While in Beatrice filling a speaking date Governor McKelvie was given the copy of a deed showing that Nebraska owns a half mile of the south jetty of the harbor at Galveston, Tex.

The deed was given to the governor by W. H. Robbins, who was a member of a committee which represented Nebraska at the time when Galveston dedicated its new harbor in 1897. The deed was made out to Alvin Saunders, chairman of the Nebraska committee, and covers the first half-mile of the southern

jetty. At the time of the death of Mr. Saunders an attempt was made to discover the original deed, but to no avail.

**U. P. Gets Right to Charge Storage for Transit Hay**

Lincoln, Neb., April 20.—(Special.)—The Union Pacific railroad has been given authority by the railway commission to make a charge of 3 cents a 100 pounds on hay as a storage-in-transit charge at Omaha on request of the hay exchange at Omaha. This will enable the road to ship hay early and not allow it to stand out in the stacks where much of it becomes damaged.
