Weekly government weather and crop report: The week was more favorable for work and the growth of vegetation in the southern states, but too cool in the western states, and too wet in most central and northern sections for farm work and advance of vegetation. General rains favorable in the southwest. Some improvement in winter wheat in all sections, being materially better in Kansas and the middle Adjantic and the Pacific states. Rainfail inf southern plains very beneficial for winter wheat. Weather decidedly unfavorable in spring wheat beit.
