

Guide Rock Dedicates Two



Is Halted by Injunction Kearney, Neb., May 11,-(Spe-ial.) - District Judge Dungan of Hastings, hearing evidence in a suit here to restrain paving under a bid reently let by the city commission-ers, sustained the injunction, but not because of irregularity in letting the contract, which was awarded to the highest bidder, the Tyner Construction company, Kansas City. The court held the other firm bidding, the St. Joseph Construction and Paving company, had not lived up to contracts in many portions of the state and also held that the city commissioners had acted entirely in accordance with the state laws in letting their contract. 
