### Honor Is Given to Miss Florence Nightingale

On Wednesday, May 12, 1920, the civilized world honors a woman. That woman is Florence Nightingale, who was born just 100 years ago in Florence, Italy. In 1853 she established the first modern training school for nurses in London. This was the forerunner of training schools for nurses in connection with a hospital. Today there is such a school in connection with practically every large hospital on the globe.

Hardly had Florence Nightingale established her London institution 67 years ago when the Crimean war broke out and revealed the usual terrors of army hospitals before the advent of the trained woman nurse. Gathering a group of her students and coworkers around her, she went out and changed the center of filth, disease and agony at

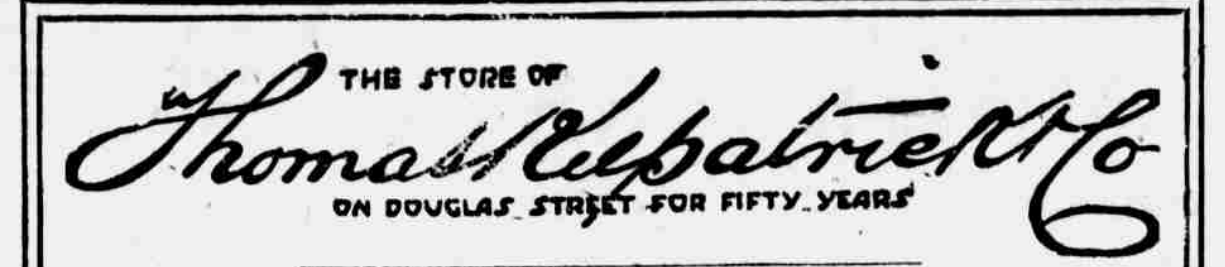
