

## CONSOLIDATION OF MIDLAND AND DANA POSSIBLE

### Fremont College Urges Union With Lutheran Schools To Be Removed From Blair.

Fremont, Neb., May 15. (Special.)—Dr. E. E. Stauffer, president of Midland college and the Western Theological seminary of Fremont, has invited Dana college and Trinity seminary of Blair to unite with the Fremont institutions, since the Blair schools are now considering a removal. All are supported by the Lutheran church, the Danish synod endorsing Dana and Trinity.

Dr. Stauffer makes four propositions to the Blair colleges. First is that the faculty of Trinity seminary become a part of the faculty of Western Theological seminary, to give such instruction in Danish as shall be deemed necessary for students who will minister to Danish congregations; second, the Western Theological seminary to vigorously push its campaign for \$100,000 for a new building, and any money contributed by the Danish synod to become an endowment for the Danish professors; third, such members of the faculty and equipment of

Dana college to be united with Midland as a joint conference seems necessary; and fourth, the United Danish Lutheran church to have six representatives on the governing board of Midland college.

"The sole purpose in making this proposition is for the welfare of the Lutheran church in this territory and in the United States, and if, after due consideration, it shall be deemed inadvisable and impracticable for the best interests of all concerned, I shall be satisfied," Dr. Stauffer said.

Hartman, Ia., it is understood, is trying to secure the two schools of Blair, which last year had an enrollment of 200 students.

peace, but staunch in the protection of our rights and interests," said General Wood. "We do not wish to be troublemakers, but we must establish a policy which will insure our standing among nations."

### Wood Urges Protection.

"We must protect Americans wherever they live, whether it be in Mexico or China; protect them against harsh and unusual treatment, when they maintain themselves within the law of the land in which they reside. The world must understand that it cannot injure American citizens with impunity. To permit it to injure the standing of our government at home and abroad and produce the impression of weakness. A firm and dignified policy in this respect will prevent any actions which may lead to serious difficulty."

Policy Productive of War.

"These words come to us like a refreshing breeze and breathe the spirit of an America of other days. The spirit which must be revived, if our people are to move about the earth feeling that they are protected by the encircling arm of a strong government which has their interests and welfare at heart. We want peace with all the world. We should be willing to arbitrate most questions, questions which do not affect our own internal affairs, or our traditional policies. We can do all these things and still have a strong, dignified foreign policy. A weak policy is productive of war, and is the most expensive luxury any nation can indulge in. It is well to remember that we shall be more successful in arbitration if we are not only right, but also strong."

Senator Johnson is silent.

Senator Johnson of California said he was not familiar with the Mexican situation and begged to be excused from expressing his views on American policy toward Mexico.

Senator Warren G. Harding of Ohio said:

"America's part in the world war was primarily and patriotically in defense of our national rights. We have established for all time the right of any American to go on a

righteous mission anywhere under the shining sun, on land or sea, in safety under the American flag. A nation which does not protect its citizenship in lawful activities at home or beyond our borders, does not deserve to survive. We wish no people's land, no territory expansions, no special privilege. But we ought to demand protection and exact justice everywhere. I would rather help Mexico to fight the illuminating torches of American righteousness and erect a temple of security, in neighborly unselfishness and love of justice than risk contagion for our republic in old-world conflicts. I would substitute for 'watchful waiting' and humiliation and anxiety an unmistakable understanding of just rights and

righteous relationships, and exact fulfillment of that understanding."

Senator Poindexter and Governor Sprout of Pennsylvania severely denounced the Wilson policy and demanded the protection of Americans in Mexico.

The only democratic candidate who expressed his views on Mexico is William G. McDoom, who said:

"It is the highest duty of every government to protect the lives and justly acquired rights of its nationals in foreign countries; that this obligation rested as heavily upon Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Peru and other civilized powers as upon the United States; that the United States must stand, always, for the protection of the lawful rights of its nationals in every foreign land."
