with possession of "moonshine." A demurrer against the indictment was fieled by the actor's attorneys, holding that failure to define "mooninvalidated the indictment. And Judge Neterer held that the demurrer was correct and dismissed

the charges. "There is no statement in the indictment that the alcoholic spirits was wrongfully brought into this country, or was illegally in the custody of any person, unless the term moonshine' charges such fact," said Judge Neterer in a written opinion.
"The term moonshine may have

derived the name from the fact that 'owling' applied to the offense of shipping wool or sheep out of the kingdom of England. That name is when the owl was abroad.

"It may not be said, however. that the term 'moonshine' in this country has attained that degree of judicial status when the court can udicially say that the term' moonshine, in an indictment charges contraband intoxicant.





SUFFRAGE DELAY

Are Bubbles Round? (Copyright, 1926, By The Wheeler Syndicate, Inc.)

A soap bubble, to use as an example the most familiar kind of bubble, is merely a hollow ball of water with air inside. The soap, partially dissolved, forms a very thin film or skin over the air which is endeavoring to force its way through it. This air ex-Erts an equal pressure in all directions and thus forces the soap-film out at an equal distance from the center of the compressed air, thus forming a perfect sphere or ball at the moment the bubble is first made.

However, after the bubble has been floating for a few moments, the water drips down toward the bottom of the ball and collects there in drops. The weight of these pull the bubble out of shape -spoil its perfect symmetry-and increase the pressure of the air inside to such a degree that bubble bursts.
