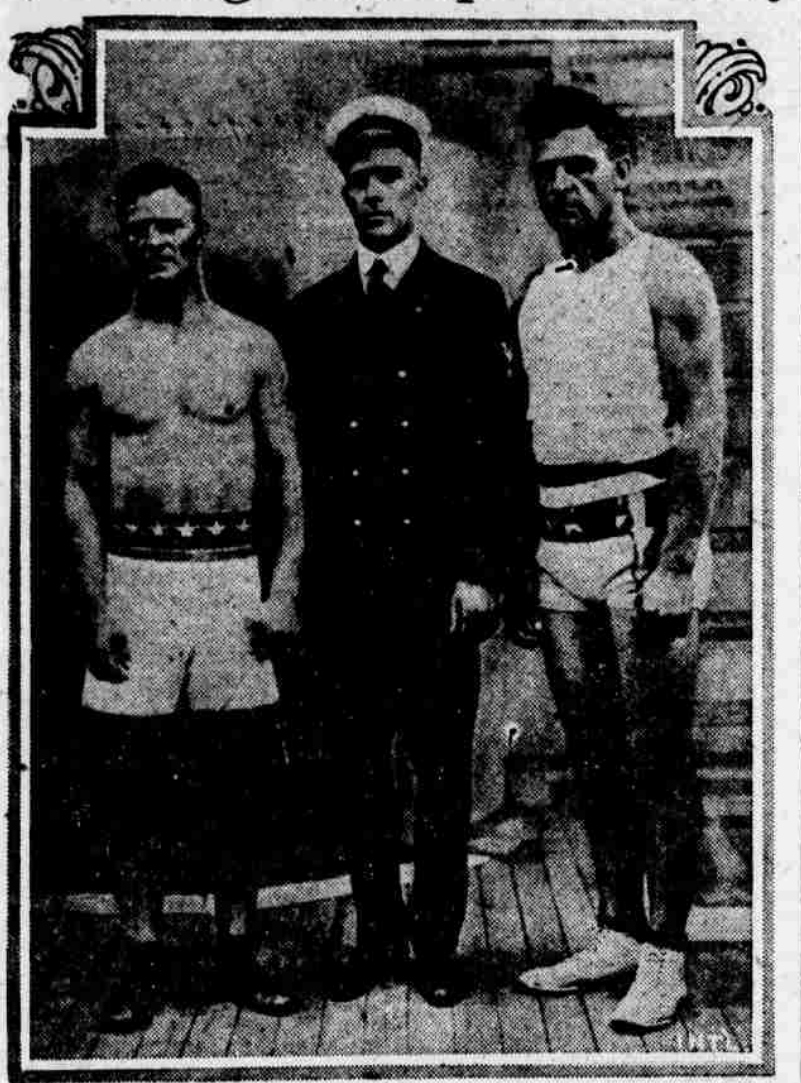

The Omaha Motorcycle club stages its annual 300-mile endurance contest Sunday, June 13. Fifty or more machines will probably take part. The route run will be from Omaha to Fremont, Neb., Sioux City, Ia., and return through Onawa, Ia. Road conditions of all kinds will be met on this route. A schedule of 25 miles an hour will be maintained and checking stations will be established at Fremont, Neb., Sioux City, Ia., and Onawa. Riders who arrive at the checking stations before the scheduled arrival or after will be penalized a certain number of points and the score of the winner will be figured from these results.

The contest is no longer a test of the motorcycle and its ability to stand up under severe strain, but is rather a contest of the rider's ability to drive his machine at a scheduled rate of speed for hours at a time.

A number of prizes will be offered. Two classes of motorcycles will be permitted to enter. One of these classes is for solo machines and the other for motorcycles with sidecars. Out of town riders who wish to enter the contest can obtain information from the secretary of the Omaha Motorcycle club.
