BRYAN WILL NOT BOLT HIS PARTY, SAY POLITICIANS

While Commoner Is Expected To Raise a Little Fuss Wise Ones Don't Fear Break

Lincoln, May 24.—(Special.)—Politicians around the state capital of Nebraska are watching with a great deal of interest the drift of things as the time for the two national conventions to meet and take action on nominees approaches.

The opinion of some that there will be a third party in case, William Jennings Bryan fails to have things his way in San Francisco and Hiram Johnson fails to land the republican nomination in Chicago apparently does not get very far with most people who know both Mr. Bryan and Mr. Johnson. They say that Bryan never has been what might be considered a bolter. He can raise a big fuss in that soft and gentle way he has, in his motto of "letting the people rule," does not happen to coincide with his view of the matter, but they do not believe he will carry his disapproval so far as to support a third ticket.

As far as Johnson is concerned, while he has participated in one bolt from the republican party, it is believed that he is wise enough to understand that any preconcerted propaganda which will give the impression that it must be Hiram Johnson or he will go out and defeat the republican nominee, will only tend to hurt his chances in the Chicago convention and will bring him no support after the first ballot.

Revivals and Park Opening Attract Hundreds of Visitors. Kearney, Neb., May 24.—(Special.)—Kearney was the mecca for hundreds of visitors Saturday and Sunday, attracted jointly by opening of the Midway amusement park on Saturday and holding of revival meetings here. The amusement park entertained thousands on opening day, being crowded to capacity in the evening. Visitors from far east as Central City, and west to North Platte were here. Sunday brought out equally large crowds, even though dancing on that day is prohibited and the swimming pool will not be opened for two weeks. The grounds have been greatly improved and many additional concessions and entertainment features added, including a roller coaster.

MANY NEW CITIES SHOWING IN RANK OF 100,000 CLASS

Akron, Ohio, Is Leading Larger Places in Percentage of Growth—Toledo Outgrows Louisville.

Washington, May 24.—The population-rank of the cities will show a large number of changes when the statistics of the 1920 census have been completed.

Several cities have moved up into the 100,000 class in which there were 50 municipalities in 1910. Some of the cities of that class, whose 1920 populations have been announced, have outgrown others in the same class while some having less than 100,000 10 years ago have taken rank well up among the country's 50 largest cities.

Akron, O., has shown the most growth among the larger cities. It has passed eight cities having 100,000 or more in 1910, whose 1920 populations have been announced. The rank of the various cities cannot be determined until statistics for all have been announced. New York, Chicago and Philadelphia, first, second and third cities of the country, will continue to rank in that order but the rank of other cities is uncertain. From statistics announced some of the changes shown in rank are:
