

Knockers' Star Out of Box and Win, 7 to 1

Donica Sails First Ball Into Missouri River

Sioux Helpless in Fuhr's Hands After First Inning, When They Score Their Only Tally.

Sioux City, May 27.—Pa Rourke's diamond proteges managed to knock Sioux City's star twirler out of the box in the third inning of today's game and to jump into a two-run lead, which grew to a runner progressed. The result was that Sioux City was beaten 7 to 1. The Packers scored their first, last and only run in the first inning on Crouch's double, Marr's infield out and DeFazio's single. After that they were unable to get a runner past second base and only five of them succeeded in progressing that far.

Mason's fly, advanced to third when Lingie singled and scored when Robinson threw the ball away after catching Mason's fly. Fuhr then singled, advancing Lingie to second, the latter going to third when Crouch threw the ball away. Gilson brought him home with a clean single to right field.

Roukes Keep It Up. The next inning started out in the same way. Platte doubled, Donica singled and Lejevel brought Platte home with a double. The heated conference between Capt. "Toney" Defazio and Pitcher Lyons, which has been a regular occurrence each time a new batter made a sacrifice, now reached a climax and the pride of the Sioux walked to the bench in disgrace as the big league scout watched. Fletcher then went in and retired the side without further scoring.

No more runs were hung up until the seventh, when a base on balls, a single, a steal home, netted another. The eighth produced two more on three singles, a base on balls and two strikeouts. Score:

Municipal League Must Cut Player Limit to 12 June 1

Amateur teams, members of the Municipal Amateur Base Ball association last night were given notice by Secretary J. J. Isaacson that they must reduce their player limit to 12 men June 1, according to article 4, section 3 of the by-laws, which reads as follows: "No team at any time shall have over 15 men under contract, and no team reserve more than 12 players after June 1. In case of unforeseen circumstances, such as accidents, desertion of players, etc., a team may, with both the approval of the league and the board of directors, sign such additional men after June 1, as the board may deem necessary."
