

Rourke and Josies Split Memorial Day Doubleheader

LOCALS WIN AND LOSE BEFORE BIG HOLIDAY CROWD

Weidell Injured and Forced To Give Place to Mason—May Be Out for Several Days.

More than 7,000 fans jammed Rourke park stands to capacity and overflowed onto the field yesterday afternoon while Omaha and St. Joseph, in a neck-and-neck race for first honors in the Western league, split the Memorial day doubleheader. The first game was Omaha's, 4 to 3, and the second game went to St. Joe, 5 to 4.

The hitting, base running and fielding of "Whitey" Gislason, Rourke second baseman, featured the big double hit. Bill Weidell, Rourke's star third sacker, was hit by a pitched ball and had to be removed from the game. A small bone in his right wrist was broken. He may be out of the game for several days.

Rourke Take First One.
