"Them's my sentiments," Capt. C. Thornburn spoke.

"O. K.," unanimously cheered the other diners.

Thus it is, that a committee will attempt to establish a ladies' auxiliary to the American Legion.

The entertainment committee of the legion has been authorized to interest themselves in the possibilities of establishing a band composed of legion members.

To Have Military Band.

In the name of Colonel Buck, commander at Fort Crook, Captain Thornburn offered to the executive committee the use of the Twentieth infantry band for any occasion.

Three representatives of the Chamber of Commerce were present at the dinner, and promised their support in assisting the legion to establish a band.

"I want you to look me over and say whether you believe the superintendent was justified in discharging me? Do you see anything immodest about this waist?" she asked.

The mayor adjusted his spectacles and quickly voiced his approval of the waist and disapproval of the man who dismissed the young woman on account of the waist.

The mayor even wrote his opinion for Miss Hofmann.
