Arrests are expected momentarily and tonight armed men under the direction of Sheriff Baldwin of Rockford and Captain Howic, Camp Grant intelligence officer, were being held in readiness to go after any sordiers taken into custody.

The names and organization of each man arrested will be forwarded to camp officials and if investigation shows that without doubt they are on leave of absence they will be ordered released, officers said. Otherwise soldiers found away from camp will be subjected to a thorough examination.
