BLOODLESS VICTORY FOR TAMMANY HALL

Boss Murphy and Governor **Smith Reach Chicago Primed** To Fight Nomination, But Meet Agreeable Surprise.

By GRAFTON WILCOX. Chicago Tribune-Omaha Bee Leased Wire. Chicago, June 19. - Charles F. Murphy, boss of Tammany hall, and Governor Alfred E. Smith, Tammany's complimentary candidate for the democratic presidential nomination, arrived in Chicago this morning to be pleasantly disappointed. They had left French Lick Springs, Ind., all keyed up for a fight to pre-vent the nomination of William G. McAdoo at San Francisco.

The first thing they learned on reaching Chicago was that the fight was off, because Mr. McAdoo had said he would accept the nomination under no circumstances and that his decision was irrevocable.

This action by the former secretary of the treasury, whose nomi-nation Tammany did not favor, left Mr. Murphy with a bloodless victory before he was even half way to the scene of the projected en-counter. He did not say much about it.
