

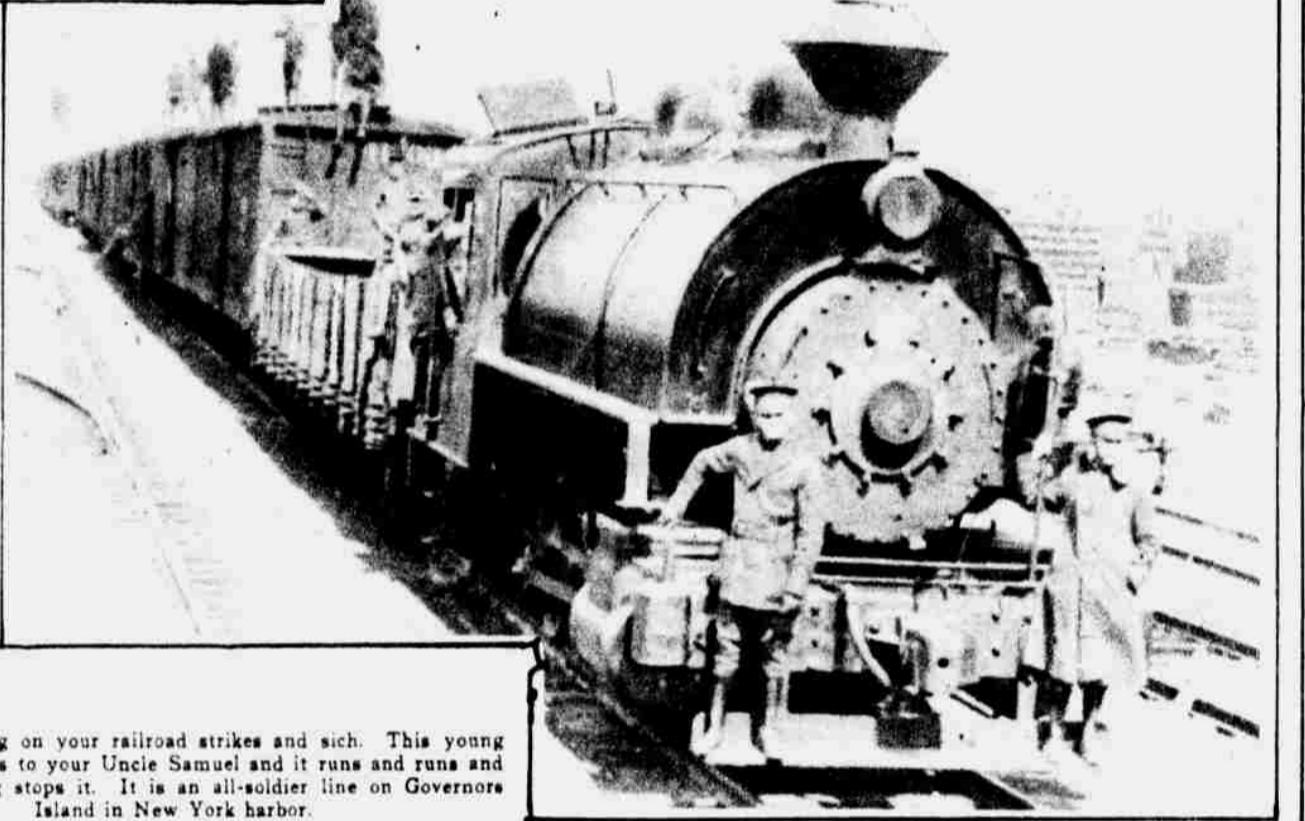
"THE LINER, SHE'S A LADY"—EVER SEE HER IN HER PRIVATE DRESSING ROOM?

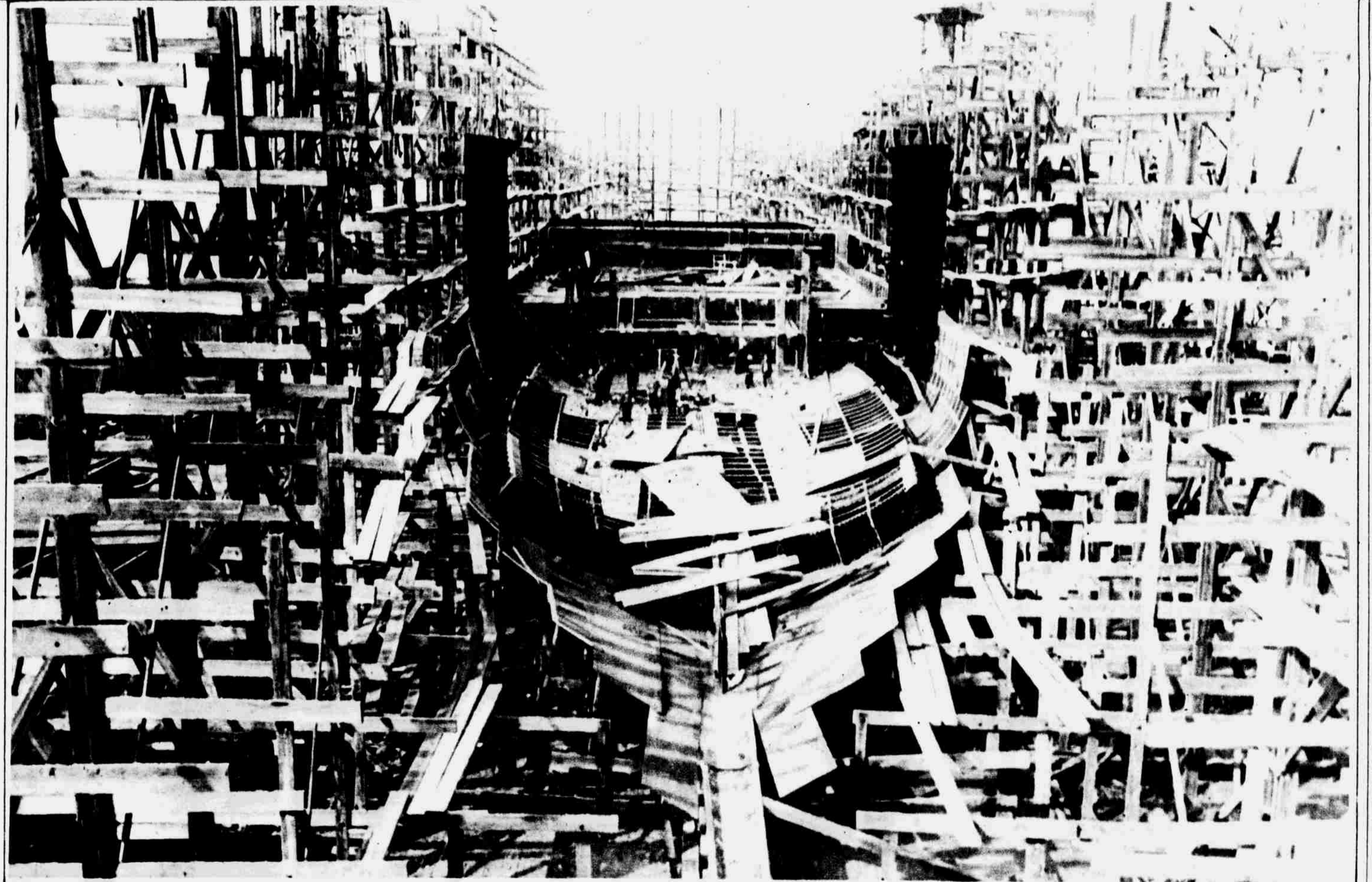
