WILD CAT OIL PROMOTERS

Indictments Returned at New York Against 14 Concerns And 50 Individuals, Charged With Using Mails to Defraud.

SAY PUBLIC SWINDLED **OUT OF MANY MILLIONS**

One Firm Alleged to Have Falsely Used Name of Son of Late Theodore Roosevelt-Stocks Sold at Huge Profit.

New York, June 24. - With the breaking of seals today on indictments charging 14 concerns and 50 individuals with fraud, government agents let it become known that they had begun a nationwide roundup of alleged wildcat oil company promoters who are said to have swindled the public out of millions within the

last few months. The defendants - oil companies. brokerage concerns and their officers and salesmen-are charged with having used the mails to defraud. They are alleged to have made gross misrepresentations and to have in some cases paid impressive dividends out

of receipts on stock sales.

Made Huge Profit. In one case the indictments charged, salesmen disposing of stock of the Crown Oil company falsely represented that a son of former President Roosevelt was an officer of the company, which it was claimed would soon rival the Standard Oil company in volume of business. Shares of this company, according
