

HARDING PUTS \$1,000 LIMIT ON CAMPAIGN GIFTS

Money for G. O. P. Fight to Be Raised by Small Contributions — No Loophole For "Boodle" Cry.

Chicago Tribune—Omaha Bee Leased Wire. Washington, June 25.—Senator Harding, republican presidential nominee, put the ban today on big campaign contributions. Funds for the campaign are to be raised by appeals for small sums of money from the rank and file of the party all over the country and \$1,000 will be the limit per person. No opposing party is going to be given a chance to raise the quadrennial "boodle" cry.

Announcement to this effect was made today by Col. William Boyce Thompson, chairman of the ways and means committee of the republican party organization, after a conference with Senator Harding. "Senator Harding has said to me, as head of the national ways and means committee, that he wants the financial side of the campaign cast in harmony with the policy of his pre-convention campaign," said Col. Thompson.

"The senator spent the least of any of the candidates in the pre-convention period and takes especial pride in having it known that the major portion of his limited fund came through small contributions from neighbors and friends in his home town. He feels, and we all agree with him, that the necessary funds for the national campaign should be made up of small contributions."

Plan Intensive Campaign.

"Our policy is to adhere strictly to the proposal of receiving contributions in limited amounts. No one can escape the realization of certain necessary expenditures in carrying on a great nationwide campaign. The republican party means to carry on an intensive campaign in order to back the government under the constitution, but it is not going to be a campaign that will commit the party to an obligation to the moneyed interests or any other single or selfish element in American life."

Through my department there has been no contribution to the republican national organization in excess of \$1,000 and we mean to go on with that limitation. There is to be no reliance on financial interests to restore the republican party to power. We hold a strong conviction that the sentiment of the country will bring the party back as an agency of popular government."

Further emphasizing the restoration of unity in the republican party, Senator Harding had an hour's conference today with Lieut. Col. Roosevelt. After the conference Col. Roosevelt said:

"I had a most satisfactory talk with Senator Harding. Senator Harding's ideas as to the policies of this country when he is elected president and as to the campaign for the presidency are such as every young, forward-looking man will endorse in toto."

Among a large quantity of letters received by Senator Harding today was this one from Tumble, O.:

"Sir: Please accept my congratulations. I am the lady whom you kept from being run over by an automobile during the G. A. R. encampment held at your city in June, 1916. I feel that I owe you a vote at least. "MARY DEAN," Senator Harding received congrat-

ulations from Senator Warren of Wyoming, father-in-law of Gen. Pershing. The senator urged him to pay a visit to Cheyenne during the campaign and assured him Wyoming would support him in the election.

Hoover Favors Elimination Of Article X From Covenant

New York, June 25.—Speedy ratification of the treaty of Versailles, after the elimination of Article X of the league of nations covenant, was urged by Herbert C. Hoover in a statement published today in the New York Evening Post as the platform on which the republican party should stand in the coming presidential election.

Mr. Hoover took the stand that the implied threat of employment of military force to guarantee the integrity of foreign states was out of place in a league which he declared was "the product of the liberal ideals of the world." The league's power, he declared, would be more potent if the threat of military force were removed and the league relied wholly on its "moral and economic power."

Communists Declare For Armed Rebellion

Washington, June 25.—Armed rebellion "by the working classes against the capitalist government" is a plank in the platform adopted in a secret convention of the newly formed united communist party held recently in the United States at the request of the Amsterdam, Holland, headquarters, according to documents made public today by the Department of Justice.

Neither the gathering place nor the exact date was announced by the department, but it was stated the convention lasted a week and was attended by 50 delegates from all parts of the United States, who went under assumed names.

Johnsons Make Effort to Control Nebraska Politics

Lincoln, June 25, 1920.—(Special)—That the spirit of Hiram Johnson of California hovers over Nebraska in other besides political ways is evidenced by the records coming to the state board of health. Last month a family of the name of Johnson in Dawson county was made happy by the arrival of triplets, two boys and a girl. North Carolina Asked to Ratify Woman Suffrage

Washington, June 25.—President Wilson has sent messages to Governor Bickett and Senator Simmons and Overman of North Carolina suggesting that he need not point out to them the "critical importance" of the action of the North Carolina legislature on the federal suffrage amendment when the assembly meets in special session next month. Fremont, Neb., June 25.—(Special).—Mrs. H. D. Dodendorf, a resident of Nebraska since 1878 and of Dodge county since 1886, died at the home of a son in Grand Island Thursday. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. J. M. Toner of Omaha and Mrs. Phillip Gumb of Grand Island and two sons, Harry W. and William E., both of Grand Island. The funeral will be held in Fremont Saturday afternoon.

Bernard is survived by six sisters, Mrs. W. W. McRoberts of Valentin, Neb.; Mrs. Charles Nordin, Misses Katherine, Josephine, Mary and Ellen and one brother, Eugene, all of Omaha, besides his parents. Identification of his body was made by the clothing he wore and a receipt for board found in his pocket.
