Women of England

Most wide-awake seemed these country women, who were presiding over their stalls of country produce, the reports say, and though some had never been to London before, none of them was aught abashed by the novel experience. The Women's Institute is a new phase of English life that has come into being since the war. Initiated by Lady Denman, with some government support, there are now considerably over 1,000 of these organizations scattered through the length and breadth of the country. Fresh villages are joining almost every day. and in the southern counties it is already almost the exception to find

a village without its institute. The root idea of the Women's Institute is that it should provide a center for all kinds of useful and amusing work of a social or educational nature. The club must be managed by the women themselves, and almost any kind of activity is encouraged in connection with it. The institute offers, in fact, an unique opportunity for the exercise of the "community spirit." And so, besides instruction in the more practical phases of country life, such as bee-keeping, sewing, cooking, a place is also found for the more cultural side of things.
