

Three Distinct Shocks Felt in California Metropolis-Several Persons Are Injured By Falling Debris.

#### DIFFICULT TO TELL EXTENT OF DAMAGE

Business at Standstill After Third Temblor-Cracks in Walls of Number of Brick Buildings Are Reported.

Los Angeles, July 16.—Three severe earthquake shocks, the first at 10:10 this morning, the second and third at 1:27 and 1:29 this afternoon, created excitement through Los Angeles and its suburbs and caused damage of a minor nature to a number of buildings and inflicted physical injury upon several men, women and children.

A chimney on a tall building in the downtown section just north of the entrance sto the Third street tunnel, fell across Third street to the south side; part of an embankment near the entrance to the Pacific electric municipal tunnel in North Hill street caved in.
