

### DAMAGE SUITS FILED BY WIFE OF BOND SALESMAN

#### Wants \$150,000 for Alleged Alienation of Affections of Her Husband, Clifford C. Mudge.

Another chapter of the Mudge domestic difficulties was opened in district court yesterday when Mrs. Edith M. Mudge filed a suit for \$150,000 against Mrs. Carrie B. Reeme of McPherson, Kan., and others, alleging alienation of the affections of Clifford C. Mudge of Chicago. This action marks back to a year ago when Mrs. Mudge appeared in Omaha and learned that her husband had been living at the St. Regis apartments with Frances Reeme, beautiful daughter of Mrs. Carrie B. Reeme.

Mudge, who earned \$25,000 a year as a bond salesman, left Omaha suddenly when his wife appeared on the scene. Mrs. Mudge obtained a decree which allowed her separate maintenance. The petition which was filed yesterday states that Mudge was "shared" by the beautiful Miss Reeme while Mudge was a guest at the Union hotel, operated by the Reemes at McPherson, Kan. The petition reads: "Frances Reeme conceived the plan of winning his love and became unusually attentive with the purpose of alienating his affections." This was in 1914.

One of the letters alleged to have been written by Miss Reeme to Mudge, and referred to in Mrs. Mudge's petition, reads: "My Sweetheart Man: It's just a year ago tonight I gave myself to you for all time. How it has all lived with me today through an afternoon of suffering—my worst day. We do not know just why, but hope all will be different tomorrow. I wonder if any of it comes back to you tonight or if you have forgotten."

#### Funeral Services for Kasner to Be Held Today

Funeral services for Fred W. Kasner, life guard at Krug park bathing beach, will be held at 2 p. m. today at the Korisko funeral home, 1201 North 16th street. Mr. Kasner died Sunday at Nicholas Senn hospital from the effects of injuries received in a motorcycle accident at thirty-sixth and Farnam streets last Thursday night. Miss Peggy Fortune, living at 1201 North 16th street, was also injured in the accident, has completely recovered.

Kasner served during the World War with the University of Nebraska motorcycle squad and was preparing to go overseas when the armistice was signed.

### FATHER FOLLOWS FORMER WIFE IN QUEST OF CHILD

#### Court Granted Him Custody, But Mother Vanishes—Chase Is Successful.

Following his divorced wife from Omaha to Merriam, Neb., and thence to Lisbon, N. D., Harry T. Pearce has secured possession of their 5-year-old child, George Taylor Pearce, and yesterday Judge Troup in district court made a permanent order giving the child to the father's custody. Mrs. Pearce secured a divorce and custody of the child about 18 months ago. Less than a year ago Mrs. Pearce was arrested at the Hotel Loyal with Claude Eckstrom of Irvington. Her ex-husband had made the complaint. Following that he secured custody of the child. December 31, 1919, Mrs. Pearce again appeared in court and won custody of the child for six months. She had married Eckstrom. They lived at Merriam until June 30, when they went to Lisbon to visit her brother. The six months for which she had been given custody of the child having expired, Mr. Pearce sought it. He and Attorney Henry C. Murphy went to Merriam and then to Lisbon where the child was secured through a writ of habeas corpus.

### Regents of State School Disregard Serum Laws, Charge

Lincoln, July 19.—(Special.)—The regents of the state university were made defendants in a suit filed in the Lancaster county district court late yesterday afternoon by Roy E. Fisher, breeder of thoroughbred swine at University place, and a member of the National Hampshire association, who asks that the regents be enjoined from the purchase, sale or manufacture, or dealing in any form in serum and virus. Fisher charges that the regents are not manufacturing the serum as provided by the legislature, but are purchasing an inferior and dangerous product, relabeling the same and selling it as their own serum. He charges that the appropriation of \$115,000 made by the last legislature should be declared void and that the management of the serum plant does not comply with the state and federal law relative to the labeling of its product. The hearing has been set by Judge Morning for Tuesday next.

### COUNCIL TELLS RINGER HE WILL BE GIVEN FUNDS

#### Police Commissioner Is Invited to Show Hand With Regard to "Mystery Girl" Case.

Police Commissioner Ringer was invited to show his hand yesterday. The superintendent of police was told by the city council yesterday that he could have all the money he needed to pursue clues which might lead to identification of the "mystery girl," whose lifeless body was found in a ravine north of Florence last fall.

The police commissioner, however, preferred to let the council's suggestion go unanswered. He substituted for his ready loquaciousness of last week an attitude of complete reticence and refused to say more than: "I have nothing to say for publication."

#### Funds Are Available.

City Commissioner Roy M. Towl brought the matter up by asking the council if funds would be given to the police commissioner for follow-up work. Commissioner Ure of the department of accounts and finance replied by expressing his belief that Mr. Ringer would be furnished all necessary funds. "I have heard and read something to the effect that Mr. Ringer stated he could not follow up the mystery girl case because he did not have funds for work out of Omaha," said Commissioner Towl. "I wanted to understand that Mr. Ringer could not now plead lack of funds."

#### Affair is a Mystery.

"Have you any information that would lead to the clearing up of this case?" Mr. Towl was asked. "I have no information nor can I say that Mr. Ringer has any information, but if the police commissioner has information he will be given funds by the council," Mr. Towl replied. The police commissioner would not say whether he would call upon the city council for funds nor whether he had any information that would lead to the apprehension of the murderers of the mystery girl. He remained as "mum" as the proverbial oyster. "The whole affair seems to be some army revolver and \$400 in cash were found on the pair who claimed to be ex-service men. They were fined \$25 and costs."

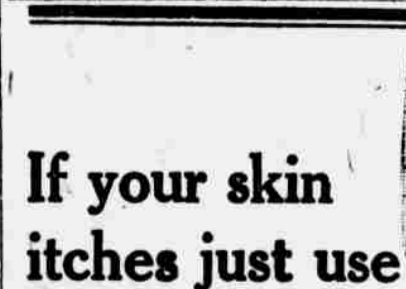

### OMAHA CHAMBER MAKES SURVEY OF STATE SCHOOLS

#### Plans Work in Interests of Rural Education—Advocates Consolidation.

The agricultural bureau of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce is working in the interests of rural education. A survey is being made through the bureau to determine what progress has been made toward consolidation of districts under the new school laws. The purpose of this body of laws, the Smith-Hughes act, has been to combine school districts for fewer and better schools. Through inquiry from county superintendents the bureau found that there were 250 communities where the farming and village interests

might combine. Thus twelve-grade accredited schools would be secured. An example of such consolidation is found in Scottsbluff. This town has arranged with the people of the surrounding area for two country ward schools of six grades each. Each ward school has three teachers. Conveyances have been obtained in order that the remainder of the students may attend the junior and senior schools in town. The schools of the entire county will thus be under the supervision of the city superintendent.

#### Three Beatrice Girls Are Committed to State School

Beatrice, Neb., July 19.—(Special.)—Ethel Fielder, Wilma Drury and Corda Carpenter, Beatrice girls who have caused the authorities no end of trouble the last few years, were ordered committed to the state reformatory for girls at Geneva by Judge Pemberton of the district court yesterday.

### Good Prospects for Corn In Southeast Nebraska

Table Rock, Neb., July 19.—(Special.)—Prospects for a bumper corn crop in southeast Nebraska were never better than this year. Although in many cases the planting was late, the favorable weather has made the growth very rapid. The month of June was favorable for cultivating and in most cases the corn is exceptionally free from weeds. The second cutting of alfalfa is of fine quality, and pastures are better than they have been for a long time.
