Are Jewels Used in Watches?

(Copyright, 1920, By the Wheeler Syndicate, Inc.) The principal reason for the deterioration of any piece of machinery is because the constant-friction wears away the moving parts and interferes with the regularity of the mechanism. A watch being a machine in which absolute uniformity of speed is essential: it is necessary to reduce this friction to a minimum-either through constant oiling, the use of ball bearings or some very hard material which will withstand the wear and tear of the continual friction. The first two of these methods are not feasible in so small a piece of machinery as a watch, so eertain very hard jewels are placed at various points to counteract

the rubbing caused by the moving Watches are generally equipped with 7, 15, 17, 18, 21 or 23 jewels, the 15 and 17 jewel types being the most popular. Intrinsically, the icwels used in the manufacture of watches are of little value but, from the standpoint of service and the specific purpose which they serve, they the invaluable. The jewels usually used in watch-making are the hardest of the precious stones, diamonds, sapphires and rubies and, of these, the most generally used is the sapphire. which combines hardness with comparatively reasonable price.

Drawn for The Bee by Sidney Smith. Polish Outlook, Say London Newspapers, Is Increasingly Bad

London, July 23 .- The Polish outlook appears increasingly menacing to commentators in this morning's newspapers. Poland not only is extremely hard pressed by the bolshevik armies, they say, but its territory is already invaded. One of the papers prints news purported to have been received by the British foreign office, which says the bol-sheviki right wing has occupied Seiny, northwest of Grodno, and about 30 miles from the nearest point on the German frontier. The bolshevik capture of Grodno is confirmed and the reds are also reported to have taken Bielosto, 110 miles from Warsaw, while in the south they iave entered eastern Galicia.

The ministry of Premier Grabski is reported to have resigned; with the administration entrusted to ex-treme radicals, with the idea, it is said, that such a government would be better able to make terms with the invaders. It is stated that preparations are being made for the evacuation of Warsaw,
