Just what may be in the mind of the attorney general has not been disclosed. Recently the Department of Justice has concerned itself with steps to prevent profiteering by coal producers. Methods of curbing prices which are soaring to unbehevable heights undoubtedly will be discussed at the conference. That the discussion will assume a much broader nature, however, is expected.

Boosting of prices to abnormal levels has been attributed chiefly to the fact that purchasers from Italy and other foreign countries were willing to pay any sort of prices, outbidding buyers from New Engiand and other sections where coal s hadly needed. Whether this situation could be controled by a voluntary agreement as to margins of profit is considered doubtful. Any effective action along this line, it is declared by those in touch with the situation, probably would have to mean the re-establishment of the fuel administration under the president's wartime powers.

Such a restriction, it is supposed, would apply to shipments from mines. until daily quotas of cars from New England had been filled

A provision of this sort would amount to a limited embargo on exports of coal. It was believed when the Interstate Commerce commission issued an order requiring permits for shipment of coal through Atlantic ports some time ago that that action would constitute an emhargo on exports. However, forcign purchasers were willing to out-bid New England buyers, and the result was that the export movement continued unchecked.




