

MISSING MAN IS FOUND IN POOR FARM IN KANSAS

Prosperous Politician of Nineties and Former Legislator Reputiated by Relatives Because of Indiscretions.

A. S. Cooley, 75 years old, prominent Nebraska politician in the 90's, who has been missing for many years, has been located at the Reno county poor farm at Hutchinson, Kan.

Mr. Cooley was a member of the Nebraska legislature from 1892 to 1896 from Cass county, and was later appointed deputy United States marshal by Senator Thurston.

Details of a stormy life in which the man fell from a position of respect and wealth in Nebraska, squandered a fortune on the Pacific coast, and finally landed in the poor house in Kansas are in a muddle.

Recalls Marital Troubles.

James Robertson, clerk of the district court in Plattsmouth, Neb., recalls marital trouble in the Cooley family in 1900.

Soon afterwards, Cooley disposed of his farm near Eagle, Neb., Robertson declares, and dropped out from sight. Cooley was divorced in Lincoln in 1900, according to Robertson, but efforts of friends of the family to suppress details of the case have been partly successful.

Cooley is suffering mental aberration. He was taken, still white working as a farm hand for Stewart Rowland, near Hutchinson, and removed to the Methodist hospital where Dr. L. E. Forney, county physician, cared for him and later removed him to the poor farm.

Has Normal Spells.

Cooley is very feeble, according to officials at the farm, but has normal spells during which he discusses current news with keen insight into politics.

He predicted the nomination of Harding and Coolidge at Chicago. All the aged man's relatives refuse to discuss his predicament or events in his life.

Doctor Forney, county physician of Reno county, declared he located several of these relatives and informed them of the old man's condition.

They refused to have anything to do with him, he said, and declined to even pay the hospital bill.

"He ruined mother's life and broke up our home," they wrote, according to Doctor Forney. "He can pay the price."

When it was suggested he should write his relatives, Cooley said: "I have gone this far. I can go the rest alone. I haven't much longer to live, anyway."

It is reported that Cooley, at the height of his career in politics, ran off with a woman to Ohio, later going to Chicago, and finally to California, where he squandered his fortune.

Became Wandering Laborer.

As soon as his money was gone this woman left him, the story goes, and he went down and up until he became a wandering day laborer up and down the Pacific coast.

Cooley does not remember what became of the woman with whom he ran away, and when the subject is broached within his hearing he cannot talk coherently. He cannot remember her name.

Cooley's case has attracted much attention in Hutchinson, where many prominent people, though condemning his actions in the past, sympathize with him in his present condition.

Cooley served in the Nebraska state legislature two terms, from 1892 to 1896. He also was at one time Deputy United States marshal, having been appointed on recommendation of the late Senator Thurston.

Former Optic Man Drowned In Effort to Save Woman

Kearney, Neb., July 30.—(Special.)—Theodore Baer, a former resident of Optic, was drowned in the Elkhorn river in an attempt to save a woman caught in a swift eddy. Baer, without stopping to remove his clothing, dived into the river. He was caught in the same swirl of water and went down at once. His body was found the next day entangled in some underbrush at almost the same point where he dived. The woman was rescued by another man in the party.

Plans Are Completed for Chinese Mission Seminary on Bellevue Hill



A magnificent Catholic seminary that will be to Omaha in beauty and prominence what the Acropolis was to ancient Athens is to be constructed on a slightly hill across the way west from Bellevue college, according to plans which have just been completed by Rev. E. J. McCarthy, superior-general of the Chinese Mission Society in America, headquarters of which are now at 5015 Bedford avenue in this city.

Grounds, totaling 220 acres, have already been purchased for the establishment of the seminary. Grading and excavation for the proposed structure will commence in spring. The seminary will be built in units, a spacious church to take up the middle section.

Cost is \$650,000.

The seminary will be mainly for the education of novices attaining to the priesthood and missionary work in the Chinese Mission society, world headquarters of which are at Galway, Ireland.

Until the building is ready for occupancy, novices in the society will be educated at the central headquarters, Father McCarthy declared. Young men in America aspiring to membership in the Mission society as missionaries heretofore have been sent to the mission home in Ireland for their education and training.

Elaborate Architecture.

The Bellevue site was chosen for the new mission home in America for its striking, natural beauty and secluded environment. Outside walls of the building will be done in brick and stone, with small towers, each bearing a cross, adorning the cornice.

Crippled Widow Fears Young Daughter May Have Taken Own Life

Widowed and a cripple, the mother of Hazel Bender, 17 years old, 2416 South Nineteenth street, fears her daughter may have taken her own life. Hazel has been missing six days.

"I would rather be dead than live like I am now. I'll drown myself or something," the girl said, according to her mother. The girl has been in poor health. She disappeared from her home Monday morning taking only the clothes she wore.

Hazel would receive \$25,000 when she is 21 years old, from a rich uncle of her mother's, the parent declares, "providing she stays home and behaves herself." Her mother knows no reason why she should have left home, and of no friends with whom she might stay.

Creighton College Dean To Become Head of Denver Sacred Heart

Vice president of Creighton university and dean of the college of arts for the last six years, the Rev. Robert M. Kelly will leave Omaha August 15 to become president of Sacred Heart college in Denver.

The Rev. William Grace of Cleveland will succeed Father Kelly here. Father Kelly came to Omaha seven years ago from Cleveland as a member of a boarding school conducted by the Jesuit fathers and has an enrollment of 300.

Two Typewriters Loot Of Burglars at Kearney

Kearney, Neb., July 30.—(Special.)—The Kearney Mills offices were entered by burglars and two typewriters, new machines, were stolen. A third typewriter was left untouched. Entrance was gained through a small window, with the aid of a jimmy. Nothing else in the office was removed and no effort apparently had been made to enter the safe, where a considerable sum of money was deposited.

Central City Man Narrowly Escapes Death Under Train

Central City, Neb., July 30.—(Special.)—Carl Rudolf narrowly escaped death when thrown from his wagon under the wheels of a moving train. Mr. Rudolf, who carries the Burlington mail to and from the station, had driven up to the track to receive the mail from the south-bound passenger, when his horse became frightened and he was thrown under the train. His left foot was cut off.

WOMAN SLUGGED WHILE ASLEEP IN BED AT EMMET

Bloodhounds Fail to Follow Trail of Assailant—Finger Prints on Window Sills To Be Examined.

O'Neill, Neb., July 30.—(Special Telegram.)—Mrs. John Torey, aged wife of the section boss of the Northwestern railroad at Emmet, near O'Neill, was assaulted and slugged with some blunt instrument while she and her daughter were asleep at the section house, the family home, Thursday. Motive for the assault has not yet been disclosed.

Mrs. Torey and daughter, with an infant granddaughter, were sleeping in a bed downstairs and the other members of the family were up stairs. Mrs. Torey awakened strangled and discovered her mouth full of blood and two teeth knocked loose. Her strangling awakened the sleeping daughter, who shouted for assistance. Neither woman was aware at the time that Mrs. Torey had been struck.

The shouts alarmed a man jerked out of a window, running toward the railroad stockyards. Sheriff Duffy has two strangers under arrest and a local character being watched. Footprints around the house are the same as those leading in the direction of the escaping assailant.

Finger-prints on several window sills show that the intruder had peered in before entering the sleeping room. Nothing in the house was disturbed and the assailant is thought to be a degenerate.

Bloodhounds from Orchard this afternoon were unable to follow the cold trail. The finger-print expert of the Sioux City police department is here to compare the prints on the windows with those of the suspects.

Three Fires at Cozad.

Cozad, Neb., July 30.—(Special Telegram.)—The Davis oil filling plant and the home of Mrs. Minnie West were destroyed and the residence of Mrs. John Stellman was slightly damaged, in three separate fires here.

GREAT INTEREST SHOWN IN TRUCKS TOURING STATE

Large Crowds View Demonstrations in Every Town Visited.

A report received Friday from L. B. Pixley, advance man for the Omaha Truck Tour, indicates an ever growing interest in the truck demonstration which is being staged this week.

Pixley's report was sent from York, Neb., on July 29, and according to his expression, the tour is going over "big."

All towns along the route have turned out much larger crowds than the dealers expected. At Nebraska City 2,500 people viewed the trucks and watched the demonstration. Entertainment committees, along the route have taken an unusual interest and have been very liberal in offering their hospitality.

At Pawnee City a chicken dinner was waiting for the boys which made them realize that there was something besides dust along the Nebraska roads.

Beatrice came in to the tune of about 4,000 and at York about 3,500 people were gathered to witness the truck parade.

No mechanical trouble of any sort has been encountered and up to the time of Pixley's report, they have had but one puncture. Trucks had covered 389 miles at York and had hauled 60 loads.

Housewives' Union Asks Governor to Save Negro

Sacramento, Cal., July 30.—Housewives' Union No. 1, with headquarters at Palo Alto, Cal., has written asking Governor W. D. Stephens to save the life of Mose Gibson, negro, who, according to police officers, confessed to seven murders after he had been sentenced to hang at the San Quentin penitentiary September 26. The letter suggested that should Gibson hang, comparison would be made with the case of James P. Watson, a white man, who recently was sentenced to life imprisonment after he had confessed to the murder of several wives.

LAD, 22, TO WED FOURTH BRIDE IN THREE YEARS

Married and Divorced Thrice, Chicago Youth After Another Wife In Omaha.

Twenty-two years old, married and divorced three times in three years and about to be married again, is the record of Richard H. Stewart of Chicago, in Omaha yesterday enroute to Tekamah, Neb., to visit his uncle, W. C. Stewart.

"I figure if a man just keeps at it long enough he's bound to get the right one after a while," Stewart said yesterday.

His first marital venture was on March 3, 1918, when he was wedded to Fay Opal Sprinkell at St. Joseph, Mo. She got a divorce.

His second wife was Marie Godman, Kansas City, Mo., to whom he was married October 26, 1919. He got a divorce and the six-months rule was suspended by the judge, which enabled him to wed Neoma Stone, also of Kansas City, on January 27, this year. The marriage was annulled.

Now the six months is up and an

Omaha girl is to be his fourth bride, the second since January 1.

"She is rather sensitive about my matrimonial adventures and nobody but her nearest relatives will know anything about it until it's all over," said Stewart yesterday.

18 Months Overseas.

"I'm going to Tekamah and visit Uncle Will and I expect to stay about three weeks. Then I will come back here and we will be married.

"We probably will live in Chicago where I have been most of the time since I got out of the army."

He said he served 18 months overseas and was mustered out just before his first marital venture.

He has been employed as office clerk and bank clerk in Chicago, Mo.
