A. S. Cooley, 75 years old, promi-nent Nebraska politician in the 90's, who has been missing for many years, has been located at the Reno county poor farm at Hutchinson,

Mr. Cooley was a member of the Nebraska legislature from 1892 to 1896 from Cass county, and was later appointed deputy United States marshal by Senator Thurston. Details of a stormy life in which the man fell from a position of
