Are Peacock Feathers Considcred Unlucky?

Probably on account of the 'eyes" which appear in the tail

of the peacock, the feathers of this bird have been considered unlucky ever since the days of the early Egyptians who main-tained that the markings of the tail feathers were symbolic of the evil eye and brought ill fortune to any house in which they were displayed.

The mythological story of the birth of the peacock bears out this superstition. According to this legend, Argus was the minister of Osiris, king of Egypt, who was left to protect Isis, the queen, when the monarch start-ed on one of his military expeditions. Argus, who was reput-ed to have a hundred eyes, soon plotted against the queen regent, imprisoned her and proclaimed himself king. Because of this insurrection Mercury was sent against him with a large army, took him captive and cut off his head, but Juno maintained that the hundred eyes should not be lost to the world, so she set them in the tail of the fowl known as the "peacock," whence they continue to spy upon the

world. Mohammedan folk-lore accounts for the raucous voice and unsightly feet of the peacock with a story to the effect that it was this bird which opened the gates of Paradise to Satan and that, as a punishment, the fowl was sentenced to lose its beautiful voice and dainty feet. hough it was permitted to re-ain its tail. 


