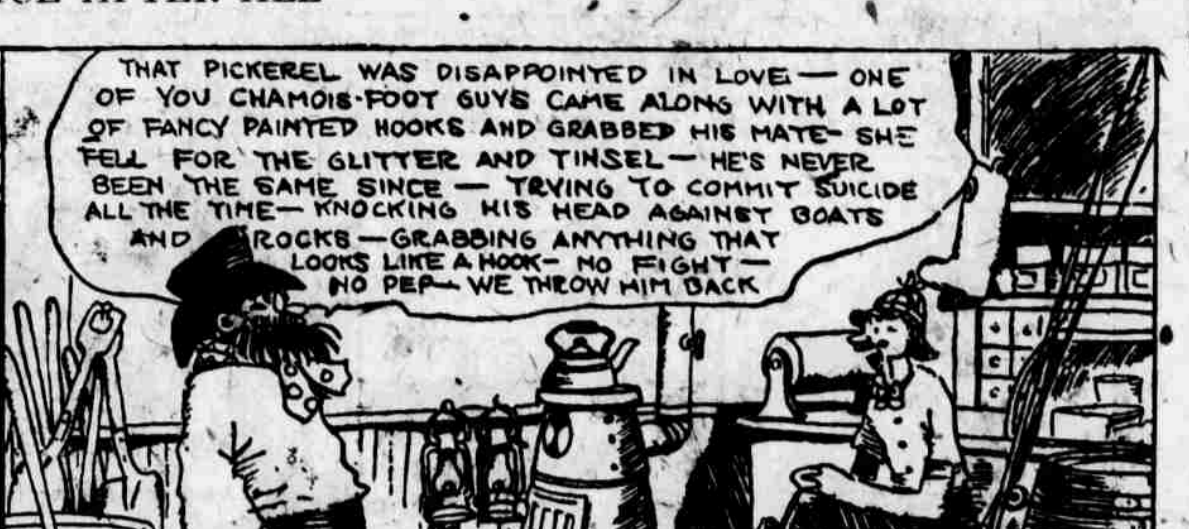

Marcus Garvey, founder of the movement for the redemption of Africa for the negro race, was elected provisional president of the African continent.

WHY?

Doesn't a Magnifying Glass Increase Artificial Heat? (Copyright, 1920, by Wheeler Syndicate, Inc.) Whistler. By the use of a reading or burning glass the rays of the sun can be concentrated upon a very small area and produce heat sufficient to melt even the most refractory of metals. But the glass, as we know, will not produce the same results in conjunction with an electric bulb, a fire or any other source of artificial heat. The reason for this lies in the fact that the shape of the radiant body itself—the original source of heat—must be such that it be brought to a very small round point at the focus of the lens. The sun, of course, the perfect body of our nature. It is round and it radiates far more heat than anything yet invented or discovered by man. Also, this radiation is constant, not flickering as in the case of a fire and its power may be gauged by the statement of scientists that every minute energy equivalent to 2,000 horsepower is exerted upon every acre of ground normally exposed to the rays of the sun. If, therefore, it were possible to fashion a sphere of fire, with a constant radiation, it would be possible to magnify the intensity of this heat at a distance with a "burning glass," precisely as we magnify the heat of the sun. But this has not as yet been accomplished, nor is it probable that it will be, because the utilization of the wasted energy from the sun is of far more interest to mankind than would be the creation of an artificial sun purely for experimental purposes.
