
Errors Lose For Schatzman---Indians Win Opener ROURKES DROP FIRST GAME TO OKLAHOMA CITY

RIOTING BREAKS OUT IN IRELAND AFTER RESPITE

Mob Pillages City Following Assassination Sunday of Inspector Swanzy-Drive On Nationalists.

Belfast, Aug. 23.—Rioting is in progress in Lisburn as a result of the assassination today of Inspector Ewanzy. An attempt was made to wreck the shop of a Sinn Fein leader within 40 yards of the scene and only intervention by Ulster voluntees prevented it.

Inspector Swanzy, against whom a verdict of wilful murder was given by a coroner's jury in connection with the assassination of Mayor MacCurtain in March, was shot while proceeding to his home from church
