Ask Appointment of Administrator for the James E. Baum Estate

Petition for appointment of an administrator for the estate of the late James E. Baum, president of the Baum Iron Works at Omaha, was filed in county court yesterday by David A. Baum, brother of the deceased. The Baum estate is valued at \$126,000, according to the petition. Mrs. Ottilia F. Baum, widow of James E. Baum, and David A. Baum are asked to be appointed administrators of the estate. Mr. Baum died in New York City on July 10. He was prominent here in business circles. The estate, consisting of real estate valued at \$25,000, foreign estate valued at \$100,000 and personal property worth \$100,000, as set forth in the petition, will be divided among the widow, brother, two sons, James E. Baum of Chicago and Richard T. Baum, Omaha, and two daughters, Mrs. Elizabeth Rouse of Baltimore, Md., and Miss Katherine K. Baum of this city.

The sheriff believes the two men seen earlier in the day staged the robbery and were headed for Omaha.

MOTORISTS WHO MEET ROOSEVELT SET SPEED LIMIT

20 Miles Per Hour Fixed to Keep Nominee Safe From Traffic Cops.
