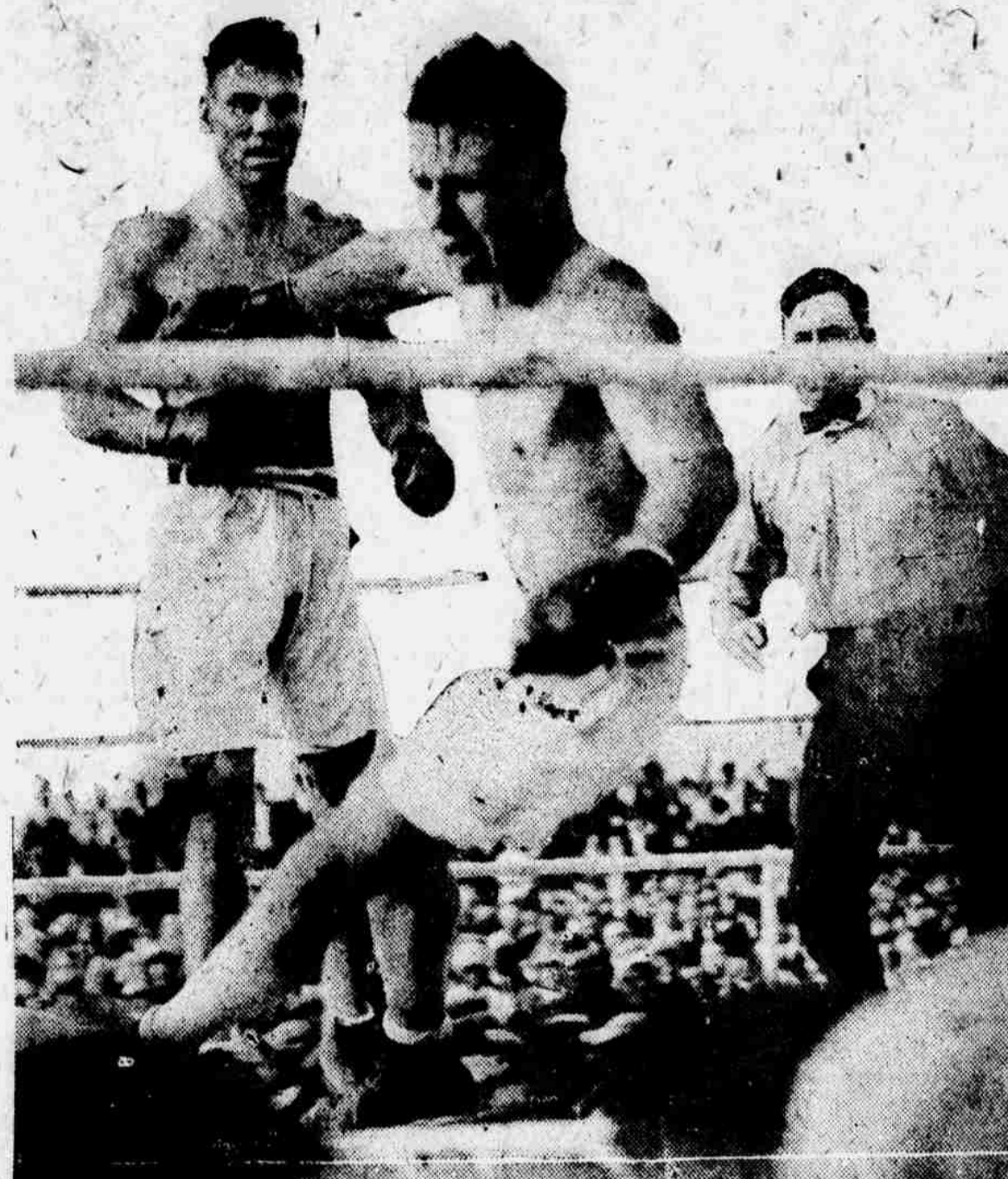

Rommell Fans Ruth, Pratt and Meusel in Eighth—Yankees Leave for Cleveland—Mays Left.

New York, Sept. 7.—Carl Mays pitched shutout ball today, New York defeating Philadelphia, 2 to 0. The Athletics got two clean hits, the others being of the scratch variety. Rommel, who pitched the eighth inning for Philadelphia, struck out Ruth, Pratt and Meusel.

Mays did not accompany the Yankees when they left here tonight on their western trip. Col. T. L. Huston, one of the club owners, announced that Mays would not be with the team during the series which opens in Cleveland Thursday, but that he would rejoin the club in Detroit.

"We are not taking Mays to Cleveland," said Colonel Huston, "not because we think there is danger of any trouble but out of respect to the feelings of the people there. We do not want to offend them. It is largely a matter of sentiment."

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Dempsey Is Given \$55,000 For Fight

Miske Heartbroken Over Failure to Stay Entire Route With Champion.

Benton Harbor, Mich., Sept. 7.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, received \$55,000 for battling Billy Miske, the St. Paul challenger, to defeat in the third round of their scheduled 10-round bout here yesterday, according to a statement of the receipts given out today by Floyd Fitzsimmons, promoter of the contest.

The total attendance of the Labor day battle was 11,348 and the total receipts were \$134,904, including state and war tax. Dempsey was guaranteed \$50,000, with a privilege of accepting 50 per cent of the receipts. Miske fought on a straight guarantee of \$25,000.

Dempsey Not Marred. After the knockout it was reported that one of Miske's ribs had been broken by the terrific punch he had received in the second round, but two physicians examined him and they agreed there was no fracture. There was a sore red spot under Miske's heart, the result of the punch, which he admitted was the blow that really started him toward defeat. His ribs were bruised but his jaw was very sore, but otherwise he showed no ill effects.

Dempsey did not have a mark of the battle. After he had dined with Promoter Fitzsimmons and a party of friends last night, he spent the rest of the evening dancing at a pavilion in St. Joseph. He planned to leave for Chicago late this afternoon and will immediately go east in search of new opponents to conquer.

"Dips" Were Busy. Promoter Fitzsimmons declared the contest was a success in every way. Despite the police protection, scores of visitors were victims of pickpockets. Secretary McCauley of the state boxing commission was robbed of \$180 at the ringside. Others reported that they had lost sums ranging from \$25 to \$250. Miske was heartbroken over his defeat. He left the ring in tears, as he had hoped to stay the limit with Dempsey, as he had done in their two previous engagements. His father and wife were ringside spectators.

East Coast Raids May be Numerous

Authorities State That Atlantic City Booze Seizure Is But First of Many.

Washington, Sept. 7.—The spectacular raid at Atlantic City on Monday when \$100,000 worth of liquor was seized, is but the first of a series by which Superintendent Kemmer hopes really to enforce adequately the Volstead act in many cities. Within six weeks, it is asserted, the Sahara will have very little on New York.

Certain large cities on both eastern and western coasts are declared to be particularly fertile spots for raids. The campaign to prevent the landing of liquor from incoming ships will be much more drastic than any yet put into force.

The government is negotiating for the purchase of certain coast islands that have become the favorite haunts of "hunting clubs" and merry yachting parties. The Florida keys contain many small sheltered harbors almost within hauling distance of Cuban supply bases while strict enforcement of the law is confronted with almost insuperable difficulties. The treasury department will ask the next congress for larger powers to enforce prohibition.

Paper Worth \$5,535,368 Imported During July. Montreal, Sept. 7.—Newsprint and book paper exported by Canada to the United States in July was valued at \$5,535,368, according to a report by the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association.

Paper exports to the United Kingdom and other countries were valued at \$1,341,628. Combined exports of paper and pulp were valued at \$10,174,747, a gain of more than 10 per cent over July, 1919.

Open Case of Utah Sugar Dealers at Salt Lake City. Salt Lake City, Sept. 7.—Hearings for submission of testimony by defendants in the federal trade commission complaint against the Utah Idaho Sugar company and the Amalgamated Sugar company, Utah concerns, Ernest R. Wolley, A. P. Copper and E. F. Cullen, Utah residents, charging conspiracy in restraint of competition in interstate commerce, opened here today.

No Reply Is Received to American Note to Italy

Washington, Sept. 7.—Baron Avazzoni, the Italian ambassador, has returned to his summer home at Newport, without handing to the State Department any formal note from Italy in reply to the recent statement of the American government's attitude as to Russia and Poland.

It is now understood that, owing to the changed situation as a result of recent Polish victories, and also because of conditions in Italy, no formal commitment to any line of policy in treating with Russia is to be expected from Rome for the present. Unofficial and verbal assurances of sympathetic support of the American position have already been presented.

Tightened Restrictions On Freight Shipments. Washington, Sept. 7.—Restrictions on the re-shipment and diversion of freight with the exception of shipments of fruits and vegetables, were tightened by an order issued by the interstate commerce commission on application of the railroads. The order is expected by the commission to facilitate the movement of freight cars.
